Right Kind Of Mistakes

When the war is over and the average American settles down to a peacetime struggle with the high cost of living there will be stories of wasteful expenditures and unnecessary use of public funds during the present war.

This is inevitable, but it is much better to expect such revelations than to look forward to narratives concerning "not enough" of the weapons of stuff of war.

If mistakes of production must occur, let them involve over-production and over-preparation. They save lives.

Jan C. Smuts On Post War World

Jan Christian Smuts, Prime Minister of the Union of South Africa and member of the British War Cabinet, discussed the "transiency of powers" early this month and expressed himself frankly as to the postwar world.

General Smuts pointed out that three of the five great powers in Europe will disappear, meaning France, Italy and Germany. He pointed out that Russia will be "mistress of the Caucasus" and that the domination of the world will be in the hands of the United States.

When the war ends, the United States will be the dominant power in the world and will depend upon their future development. Travel facilities, according to the general, will be economically poor, which, concentrated by the vast resources of Russia and the United States.

The South African leader suggests that it might be to the interest of Great Britain to work together with the small democracies of Western Europe, which by themselves may be lost. He thinks that their place is with Great Britain and that their future is tied up with the world-wide British system.

General Smuts dismisses as impractical an Anglo-American political axis, saying the world will become lopsided if the United States and Great Britain attempt to rule by themselves. Opposition would be aroused and "other lions" would arise to dispute the English-speaking dominion.

Railroads Look To The Future

The railroads of the nation are expected to roll up a total of eighty billion miles of passenger traffic this year which is equivalent to six hundred miles on non-commuting trains for each man, woman and child in the country.

This record-breaking traffic is nearly double the peak performance of the first World War. It has about convinced top railroad executives, that when the war is over, the carriers can expect to compete with buses and planes for the transportation business of the public.

The trade publication, Railway Age, reports an almost complete unanimity of belief among the country's railroad executives that most of the present-day rail equipment will be replaced with light-weight, stream-line trains. In less than ten years, the number of stream-line trains has increased from one to one hundred and twenty-four, and public acceptance has been overwhelming.

The publication reports that many executives favor reduction in fares and some of them advocate coach fares of one cent per mile. They recognize the advantage of over-all speed, hinting that schedules will be faster.

One executive admits that streamliners on his railroad are operating at speeds up to one hundred miles per hour and intimates that post-war schedules should make at least seventy miles of actual travel. Undoubtedly, the public will take advantage of cheaper rates and faster transportation. With their care-

HEALTH DEPARTMENT ACCOMPLISHES MUCH WORK DURING YEAR

Pre-school examinations totaled 157 before the close of school year, and just before the opening of the present school year. These were conducted at every school in the county. Talks have been made to school groups and Parent-Teacher Associations on all phases of public health protection by different members of the department, and sound motion pictures relating to these subjects have been shown.

Sanitary supervision of all food handling establishments, meat markets, dairies and trailer camps has been maintained. A much-needed restaurant has been opened in Hertford with adequate sanitary facilities. This work has entailed upward of 300 visits for instruction and inspections. Plans have been provided for the construction of one sanitary slaughterhouse and work is progressing toward the building of that house; other slaughterers are preparing to provide themselves with sanitary slaughtering facilities.

Two hundred, eighty-nine patients have been registered with the department for treatment of venereal disease; 867 blood tests for syphilis have been made. The weekly venereal disease clinic held at the department each Tuesday afternoon and evening from 2 until 7 o'clock, has expanded progressively. Treatments for syphilis total 3,228, and 248 for gonorrhoea.

The work of the department in Tuberculosis Control has been done in close cooperation with the Perquimans County Tuberculosis Seal Sale Committee and the Extension Department of the North Carolina Sanatorium. Tuberculin testing of contacts of known cases of tuberculosis was started during the summer, and all school children were tuberculin tested during October and November. Altogether, 2,005 Tuberculin Tests have been done. The Chest X-ray clinic which was held in Hertford on November 16, 17 and 18, did 493 X-rays, of which 39 or 7.9 percent showed some evidence of Tuberculosis. Sanatorium applications have been entered for patients who are in need of this type of care. An intensive search is being conducted to discover all previously unrecognized cases of Tuberculosis who may have been responsible for the positive Tuberculin tests found in school children.

The Health Department has experienced the same difficulties that all other activities have encountered during these months, chiefly in obtaining personnel, in obtaining necessary equipment, and in overcoming resistance to transportation. Since a new District Health Department has been a part of the organization, the sanitary officer, has placed an excessive load on Mr. Miles. Efforts have been under way for some time to replace Mr. Miles who left in August, and there is reason to hope that the position may be filled in the near future. Dr. Perry, the Venereal Disease Control Officer who worked with the department from its start in March, was transferred by the Public Health Service in November. Dr. Gustav Highstein has replaced Dr. Perry temporarily, and has carried on the work very fully.

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It will be necessary, however, for the carriers to develop a new aggressiveness in the battle with competitors. It is not amiss to say that considerable improvements must be made in the effort to assist the traveling public by extending various courtesies and making available ample information as to railroad transportation.

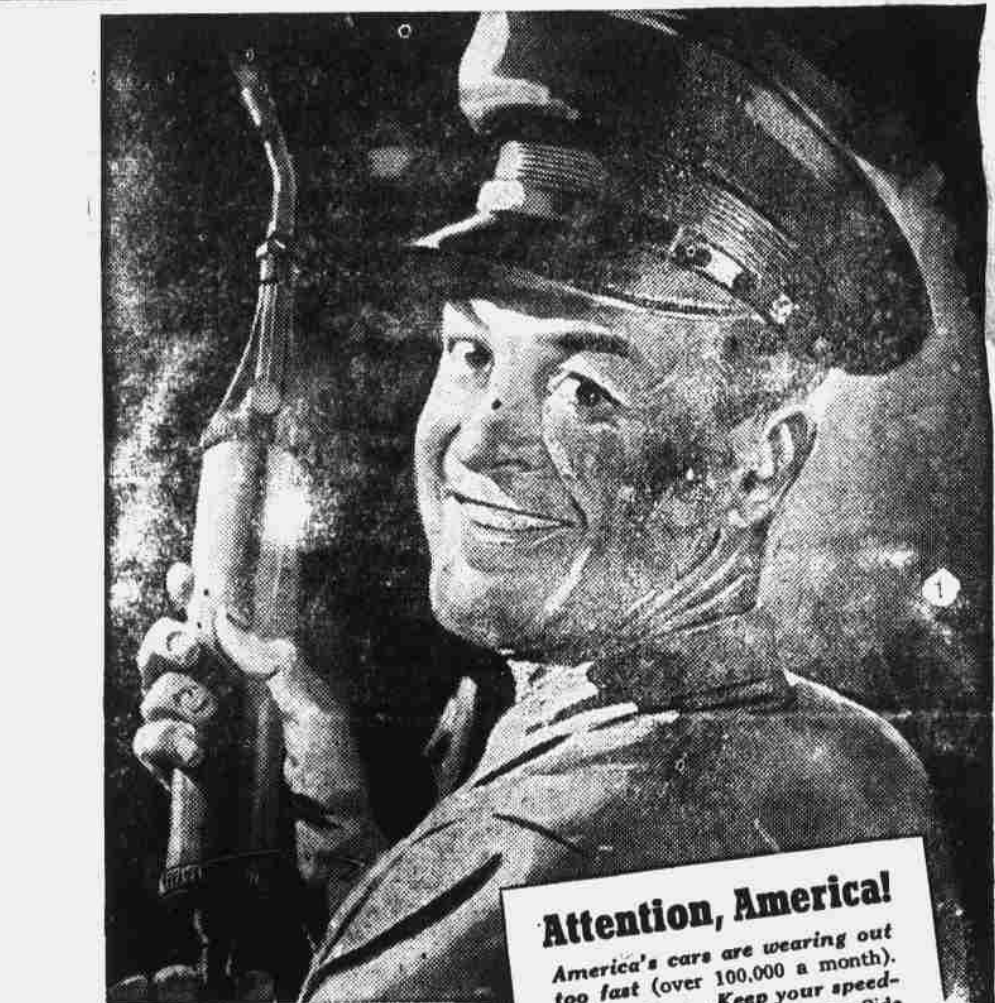
