Sale of war bonds in Perquimans County has dropped off considerably during the past several weeks, R. M. Riddick, chairman of the local war finance committee, announced today. Sales during the month of April

amounted to \$9,868.75, while the quota was more than \$19,000. The sales during the last month were off almost ten thousand dollars, Mr. Riddick said.

The chairman announced that the War Finance Committee is now making the preliminary plans for conducting the Fifth War Loan drive, which officially opens June 12. Mr.-Riddick stated that the committee has not yet received a quota for Perquimans for this drive, but expects the amount of bonds to be sold here
