

State Peanut Crop Outlook Is Good

The State Agriculture Department, in co-operation with the United States department of agriculture, issues the following statement on the peanut crop:

"In the southeast planting conditions for peanuts have continued very favorable. In the extreme southern portion of the section the major portion of the crop has been planted, while farther north from 50 to 60 per cent is in the ground. All peanuts which are up are showing excellent stands and growing well.

Planting is just beginning in a limited way in the Virginia-Carolina area. Rains toward the end of last week greatly improved moisture conditions. Prior to those rains some locations were becoming rather dry.

"The market situation remains unchanged with most of the present offerings by mills consisting of seed stock, most of which is being treated. The current movement of edible peanuts is light in all sections. Demand continues fairly good although some decreases in demand for peanut butter is being reflected in reduced demand for peanuts. In the Virginia-

Carolina area demand for cleaned peanuts continues only fair, although other grades are insufficient to meet present demands. FOB prices are generally at ceiling with many resales including the one cent jobbers markup over the basic ceiling price."

Feed And Fertilizer Sales Are Increasing

Purchases of feed and fertilizer in North Carolina continue to "soar upward," D. S. Coltrane, Assistant Commissioner of Agriculture, reports in announcing that total sales of fertilizer from July 1, 1945 to May 1, 1946, were 1,464,963 tons, as compared with 1,360,799 tons for the same period last year.

With regard to feed, Coltrane pointed out that despite the apparent scarcity, the largest quantities of feed since the record set in 1943 are being sold. From July 1, 1945 to May 1, 1946, feed tonnage sold totaled 724,716 tons, as against only 689,854 tons in the period from July 1, 1944 to May 1, 1945.

Since January 1 this year, sales of feed have run to 266,371 tons, while the figure for this four months' per-

iod last year totaled 248,404 tons.

Coltrane said that while various agricultural leaders have been anticipating during the past six to eight months at least a gradual decline in the sale of feed and fertilizer, there is now no indication as to when the lull in the purchase of these items will occur. He added that it now seems apparent that the only thing which can cause an immediate reduction in the sale of fertilizer and feed will be a shortage of these products.

Coltrane pointed out, however, that North Carolina mills are not getting feed ingredients, and that farmers, dairymen, and poultrymen are being forced to purchase their feeds from out-of-State concerns.
