The idea behind such a service should not be to persuade, but to inform, and the net result. should be to give to the public the facts upon which intelligent opinions can be formulated.

To Propose 4-Year House Term To Avoid Legislative Deadlock

Senator Carl A. Hatch, of New Mexico, plans to introduce a constitutional amendment which will set the terms of members of the House of Representatives at four years each, instead of two, and thus open the way for House members to be elected when the President is elected, insuring, to some degree, that the House and the President would be long to the same political party.

The purpose of the amendment is to avoid situations like those resulting from midterm elections when, as now, the complexion of Congress ichanged.

In 1918, when the House went Republican. President Wilson lost control and there was something of a legislative deadlock. The same thing happened in 1930, when the Democrats captured the House and Presi dent Hoover was left without complete legislative support as the second omic crisis developed.

There is much to be said for the proposal of Senator Hatch but there is, nevertheless, something to be said in opposition. The entire theory of the American Government is based upon a system of checks and balances. One of these instruments is the dif ference in the election of members to the House and to the Senate.

One-Sided Disarmament Will Senator Elbert D. Thomas, of Utah,

chairman of the Senate Military Affairs Committee, warns that one-sided disarmament will fail in the future, as in the past, to produce either peace or security.
