

Work Progressing On New Harris Bldg.

Work on the new building, being constructed here by the Z. A. Harris family, which will house the Don Juan manufacturing unit, is progressing rapidly and is expected to be ready for occupancy about June 15, according to Jesse Lee and Edison Harris, who are superintending the construction.

The building is being constructed of concrete blocks and is 50 feet wide by 1500 feet in length. It is located on the lot adjacent to the Harris store on Grubb Street.

Just as soon as the building is completed, according to Mr. Harris, it will be occupied by the Don Juan Company, which is expected to increase its employee list from the present number to about 135 people. The expansion program of the company, which moved here late last fall, is also expected to be a boost for the local payroll figures. The payroll of the Don Juan Company is expected to jump to somewhere near \$3,000 per week.

It is worthy of note that the preaching of Haggai had two effects on the people. It aroused their consciences to their selfishness in providing for their own material comfort without providing an adequate place for the worship of God and their activity as a result of their arousal brought about a revival of religion in their own hearts and in their community.

It has never failed—unselfishness always strengthens our faith and courage. Selfishness limits God's gifts to us, for when we are selfish, we are satisfied with small things al-

though we are often capable of doing big things.

While the second temple did not in any way equal the magnificence of Solomon's temple, the people did the best they could under the circumstances, which is all that God required of them, or us.



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
