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THIS WEEKS HEADLINES

General Dwight Eisenhower all but wrecked the "Stop Truman" delegates to the Democratic National Convention this week when he again announced that he will not be a candidate for political office. A number of delegates to the convention attempted to revive a draft for Eisennower during the past two weeks, but this was halted with the General's announcement. Reports now state that the "anti-Truman delegates" are switching to William Douglas. The convention will meet next week at Philadelphia, and President Truman, according to reports, is still confident of nomination on the first ballot.

Western Allies stepped up their air freight traffic into Berlin during the past week after Russia refused to lift its blockade of rail traffic into the German capital. The situation in Berlin is reported near the serious point what with millions of Germans, as well as the Allied forces, being forced to ration foodstuff and medical supplies, due to the limited amount being received in the capital. Reports from Washington Wednesday stated that strong notes had been sent to Moscow in an attempt to force the Russians to lift the blockade.

Fourth of July holiday death totals reached a new high throughout the nation as various offices counted the accidents which occurred over the past week-end. At least 571 persons met violent death, while other hundreds suffered injuries. A report stat-ed the record was the third worse in the last twenty years. Highway accidents accounted for 306 of the deaths.

Judge Grants Bond In Shooting Case

On motion of defense attorney, W. H. Oakey, Jr., in Recorder's Court here Tuesday morning, Judge Charles E. Johnson granted bond to Willie Williams, Negro, held in jail pending the issuing of a warrant charging the 39-year-old Negro with assault with a deadly weapon with intent to kill Charlie L. Skinner, Hertford Negro. Bond was set at \$1,000.

Sheriff M. G. Owens and Police Officer Trotman Miller placed Williams in jail last Saturday night after a shooting affray at Jack White's tavern located at the foot of Church Street. According to Sheriff Owens, Skinner was shot by Williams with a .22 calibre automatic rifle and was hit several times, two of the bullets ri-cocheting off the top of Skinner's head, three went through the upper left arm, two through the lungs and chest. Trouble between the two men, it was reported, began over a gambling dispute.

Skinner was taken to the Albemarle Hospital, where he was reported on Tuesday to be in a satisfactory condition, and is expected to live.
