In form, Revelation follows the regular lines of Apocalyptic literature, using what had become its standard symbolisms. Its basic ideas are also those of Apocalyptic. The reality and superiority in value and power of the heavenly order as over against the shadowy unreality and passing weakness of the brutal and material early systems are emphasized with all the force of Apocalyptic at its best. The end of the world and its judg-ment before the throne of God are prophesied as near at hand.

In describing how Jesus would interpret Apocalyptic literature in the Bible, Hewitt B. Vinnedge declares: "When he (Jesus) spoke in the accepted eschatological way, of judg-ment and a Kingd as D come, he was using language ch his listeners would understand to which there would be a warm re nse. But if he spoke in less violent arms than some about the ushering it of the Kingdom, he did so in order that he might place the emphasis on its greater themes of love joy neares themes of love, joy, peace.

"His use of the idiom of the Kingdom was the best way in which he could possibly have conveyed certain basic elements of his teaching; that despite all the forces of evil, God is still sovereign; that despite disorder and discontent, blessedness is yet attainable through the power of God and obedience to him; that despite the varieties of obedience and disobedience among human individuals, God's plan looked forward to a divinely ruled society. There can be no kingdom of one. A kingdom is a social concept and Christ must reign supreme in one's own heart."

The publicity given the discovery by the committee indicates that in the opinion of the officials, at least, the films are of tremendous importance. 






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
