Congressman Herbert C. Bonner has been secured as the guest speaker for the meeting which will convene at the Perquimans High School at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon. Principal business scheduled for the meeting is the election of a Board of Directors for the corporation. Each of the counties, comprising the Co-op, will be represented on the board with the election of two directors from each of the counties and one director at large will be selected.

A large number of door prizes, donated by manufacturers and local business houses will be awarded at the close of the meetings, and it has also been announced that some displays of appliances will also be made. Prominent Resident of The nominating committee of the Co-op, which met on January 8, selected 18 prospective directors of which number Charles E. White, A. T. Lane, John Q. Hurdle and Floyd Mathews represent Perquimans Coun-

ty. A report issued last week showed that the Albemarle Electric Membership Corporation served 1,344 members as o fclose of business in January, it operated 391 miles of electric lines. The Co-op is now undergoing expansion, some 231 additional miles of lines are to be construct ed during the next three months, and this will enable the Co-op to serve throughout the four counties.

The local Co-op was organized early in 1945, when a number of residents of the four counties indicated a desire of REA service. Immediate steps were taken to form the organization and construction of lines began shortly thereafter. The first lines were energized in 1946 and the corporation has shown a constant growth since that date.

Robert Timothy Brinn, 64, member of the Perquimans County Board of Commissioners and a widely known resident of Hertford, died at his home here last Friday morning at 11:30 following an attack suffered Thursday afternoon.

A life-long resident of Perquimans County, Mr. Brinn was actively engaged in business here for a number of years and was always associated with civic affairs. He served as a member of the Town Board for 14 years and formerly was a member of the Rotary Club and the Chamber of Commerce, when that organization was in being.

He was a member of the Hertford Methodist Church and served for a long time as a member of the Board of Trustees of that church.

Prior to World War I he was a Naval Reserve officer and in this capacity made a trip around the world. In recent years he confined his busi-ness activities to farming.


