Leroy Sires, versatile catcher for the Hertford Indians, continued to lead the Albemarle League players in batting, according to a report issued last Saturday by Bill Cozart, league statistician, for all games through July 19th. Sires was hitting .372, while his teammate, Bill Bergeron, next in line for the full 36 games was hitting .342. Sires also led the league with runs batted in having a total of 33. He was second for two base hits, with nine and third in home runs with five.

FACTS ABOUT BEER

From the Census of Manufactures

The U. S. Census of Manufactures supplies what is probably the most authoritative index of an industry's place in the national economy.

Preliminary reports for 1947, the first business census since 1939, are now being released by the Government. They show that the brewing industry makes a valuable contribution to the nation's welfare and economy.

The Government report shows that in 1947, the brewing industry paid out \$292,000,000 in both wages and salaries, spent \$509,000,000 for materials, supplies, containers, fuel and contract work, and another \$111,000,000 for new plants and equipment—making a total of approximately \$912,000,000.

The brewing industry employed 82,524 persons—63,668 of them being engaged in production and other related operations. This latter group averaged \$3,300 per year per worker—one of the highest wage averages to be found in any American industry.

For three centuries beer and ale have contributed to moderation and temperance in America. The Census report confirms that economically, too, beer's legal sale and manufacture is an American asset worth preserving.
