Perquimans Steering Committee To Meet Next Tuesday

Some facts about the mass chest X-ray survey to be conducted in Perquimans County from December 7 through January 14, by the Pasquotank - Perqu i mans-Chowan - Camden Health Department were revealed to-

The free chest X-ray will be availble to all persons in Perquimans County, white and colored, who are lifteen years of age or older. It akes only a minute or two to be X-rayed, there is no undressing for the X ray and every person who is X-rayed will receive a confidential report by mail.

This chest X-ray service is made possible by the District Health Department and the Perquimans Christmus Seal Committee which have requested the Tuberculosis Control Division of the State Board of Health to come to the county and make the sur-

The State Board of Health will furnish five mobile X-ray units and technicians to take small X-rays free. The units will make stops in Hertford and four other locations in this county, the schedule will be announcde later, and a person may go to any stop he wishes.

Certain expenses connected with this survey will be borne by the Perquimans Christmas Seal Committee.

Following the X-ray and examination of the film, if the X-ray shows that the chest of the individual is all right, that person will receive a postal card advising him of the same. If the physician sees anything in an X-ray which needs further study the health department will request that individual to come into the department for a second and larger film, which will also be free. Persons who have ever been under treatment for twherculosis should not go into ope of the trailers for an X-ray, but instead, they should go to the Helath Department and get a large X-ray

Members of the Perquimans steering committee, which meets next Tuesday are expected to make plans for publicizing this program and encouraging the people of Perquimans to take advantage of it.
