

License Revocations Pass The 100,000 Mark

The grand total of revocations of drivers' licenses in North Carolina passed the 100,000 mark in November, the Department of Motor Vehicles reports.

Nine hundred twenty-five revocations in November brought the grand total to 100,345. Suspensions numbered 229, bringing the grand total to 101,112.

Drunken driving again topped the list of revocations. A total of 888 persons lost their driving privileges from this cause as compared with 678 in the month of November last year. Sixty-two persons were convicted of two offenses and one of three.

Other violations bringing about revocations or suspensions were: driving after license revoked, 46; driving after license suspended, 14; two offenses of reckless driving, 24; reckless driving involving personal injury and property damage, five; speeding over 75 miles per hour, 38; two offenses of speeding over 55 miles per hour, 10; larceny of automobile, 10; involuntary manslaughter, one; manslaughter one; grand larceny, one; transporting liquor, 28; improper use of operator's license, four; unsatisfied judgment, seven; incompetency, six; habitual violator, six; failure to maintain proof of financial responsibility, 99. A total of 574 reckless driving cases were listed, but these do not require revocation or suspension on one offense.

In addition 7,113 cases of moving violations, which do not constitute

revocations or suspensions on first offense, occurred in November. Speeding led the list with 2,801. Failing to have driver's license was second with 1,655. Other violations were: faulty equipment, 772; improper lights, 412; running through red light, 486; passing a loading or unloading school bus, 115; driving on wrong side of the road, 83. Of the total number of violators, 888 were from out of the state and 6,225 were North Carolinians.

Fred Wagoner Gets State 4-H Position

MINUTES OF MEETING BOARD OF EDUCATION

The Board of Education met in regular session Tuesday, December 6, 1949, in the office of the secretary, Chairman J. A. White presided. All members were present.

Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The method of inspection of school buses was discussed and explained by the superintendent. He discussed the uniform procedure to be followed for inspection and reporting results. Read a statement from State Board of Education re-affirming its complete confidence in the system of transporting children of the state to and from school.

A group of Negro citizens repre-

senting the P. T. A. of the Perquimans County Training School, was received and heard with reference to their school. The expressed the desire of retaining a high school in Winfall. They were assured by the Board that the Winfall school would be one of the first projects to receive attention. They were also advised that the Board of Education was endeavoring to give the Negro school children in Perquimans County the very best school facilities possible with the available funds.

Bids were opened by Mr. Raymond Fuson and tabulated by the secretary for a vocational shop and physical education building at Perquimans County High School. (Complete tabulation filed with minutes.) Certified checks and bid bonds required of all

bidders were returned to all except on the two low bids. The two low bids are to receive further consideration at a meeting to be held Friday, December 16, 1949, at 7:30 P. M.

The superintendent was authorized to pay Mr. Tilley \$25.00 for services rendered in lieu of a summer vacation.

Superintendent was directed to have all employees of the school system sign a contract stating the scope of their duties, responsibilities, length of contract, vacations, and obligations.

Board authorized payment of actual expense of members attending State Board meeting in Chapel Hill, December 7, 1949.
