## SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

THE UNIVERSAL GOD

International Sunday School Lesson for December 18th, 1949

Memory Selection: "Ye shall seek ne, and find me, when ye shall search for me with all your heart."—Jeremish 29: 13.

Lesson Text: Jeremiah 29: 1, 4-14; 81: 8.

After the Babylonians had forced Jerusalem to end its rebellion by an unconditional surrender, the ablest and best of the population, all those who might be dangerous as leaders of a revolt, were carried away captive to Babylonia. Those who were left behind under the rule of the Babylonian appointed king, Zedekiah, were a sorry lot indeed.

But these who were left, weak though they were, attempted to plot rebellion and to persuade some of the earlier exiles in Babylon to join in the plot. Jersmiah, who had remained in Jerusalem, denounced as godlets folly such a plan and he took advantage of an embassy which the king was sending to Babylon to write to the exiles, trying to dissuade them from the madness of stirring up trouble there. It is this letter that we have as a basis for our study.

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Jeremish reminds the exiles that God is not confined to the temple nor to the city of Jerusalem, nor to the land of the promise, but in their far-off land of captivity. God's people may find him in prayer and find him in all the plentitude of power, able and willing to bless. Thinking as they did of Jehovah as something limited in the full exercise of his powers to the holy land, the exiles could find hope only in an expectation of their own speedy restoration to their homeland.

Jeremiah wanted to give his people a realization that Jehovah was the one God of all the earth, independent of all geographical limitations, always ruling in a righteousness which would never tolerate sin even in Jerusalem, everywhere present to guide and bless all those who

called upon him.

This theme—the availability of God—is the message of the Bible. All great souls who vere lived can attest its truth. Fellowship with God may be had by every one at any time, in any place on one very simple condition. It can be had by those who really want it and only by those. It is a very great thing, the greatest thing in life and, like every other great thing, it can be had only by focusing life upon it.

It is well to remember, also that God is not only available to all, but he is inescapable to all. Whether we take God into our lives or not, we cannot vote ourselves out of his world or escape the operation of his laws. God has a part in every transaction in which we are concerned and he who decides its ultimate outcome in the shaping of our destiny. This is true whether we know it or not, or whether we acknowledge it or not. Our failure to know it simply means that our life calculations are being made in ignorance of the most important ele-

ment in every situation.

It is a kind of madness which leaves God out of our thinking and our planning. A text we might well have printed and hung up where we can see it easily is: "Be Not Deceived; God is not mocked; for whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap."

This truth is as true today as it was when Paul first wrote it to his Galatian converts.

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And, let us remember, God is anxious to meet the wanderer seeking to return to him. Even though Judah disobeyed Him and insulted Him with willfulness and idolatry, God stood by and did not utterly forsake him. It was this trustworthy, sturdy God whom Jeremiah counted on to bring the people out of their captivity at the end of their seventy-year punishment.

Jerumiah knew that when he needed God, He was near by, available. How weidenfelly this faith is realized in Ham who promised, "Lo, I am with you, even unto the end of the world." God is a personal God, a God with personality. We do not pray to some vague "first cause," but to One who hears and loves us. It is this realization of the Presence that brings vitality to prayer and the courage to live a good life. Life is a different thing to a man who believes in and puts his trust in Jehovah God.
