Don't Let Slip Put End To Trip

Don't let a slip put an end to your trip.

That's the warning given today by County Agent I. C. Yagel of the State College Extension Service. The usual traffic hazards with which motorists must contend are about doubled at this time of year, he points out.

When bad weather strikes, says the county agent, the best policy is to avoid going out on the highway at all. But those who have to drive should take every precaution possible to make their cars and driving accident-proof.

Here are six rules endorsed by the National Safety Council and recommended by the county agent:

When starting out, get the "feel" of the road by trying your brakes while driving slowly and when no other vehicles are near.

Adjust speed to conditions. Slow

down on wet, snowy, or icy roads so you can stop in time if you have to.

Use tire chains on ice and snow. They reduce braking distance as much as 60 to 70 per cent.

Keep your windshield and windows clear of fog, frost, snow and ice. Be sure your headlights, windshield wipers and defrosters are in good working condition.

When you have to stop, pump your brakes. Jamming them on may lock them and throw your vehicle out of control.

Follow other vehicles at a safe distance. It takes three to 12 times as long to stop on snow and ice as on dry concrete.
