

## Bonner Seeks Aid For Farmers Due To Rain Damage

Congressman Herbert C. Bonner has conferred with officials of the Production Marketing Administration and the Commodity Credit Corporation in an appeal for aid for eastern North Carolina potato farmers whose crops have been flooded by heavy rains.

The proposal—to estimate the crop in the field and give the farmers support prices accordingly—had been declined by both the PMA and the CCC at an earlier conference with North Carolina farm leaders.

But Sylvester Smith, PMA head, and E. F. Kruse, assistant CCC administrator, assured Congressman Bonner that the proposal will be reconsidered.

Congressman Bonner pointed out that the growers had been urged to delay their potato digging to prevent flooding the market. Otherwise, they probably would have gotten their spuds out of the ground before the rains.

## 4-H'ers To Observe Silver Anniversary

The 25th anniversary of the 4-H Club work in North Carolina will be celebrated at State College July 24-28 when the annual State 4-H Club Week is held with some 1,400 members from all parts of the State attending.

Program for the week has been announced by officials of the State College Extension Service. Most of the speakers will be former 4-H Club members.

members. All were outstanding in club work and are now outstanding citizens in their respective fields.

The first State 4-H Club Week was held 25 years ago with less than 400 members attending. This year boys and girls from every county in the State will be present.

L. R. Harrill, present State 4-H leader, has headed 4-H work for the full quarter of a century, and this year's program will be dedicated to him. He was responsible for combining the original corn clubs for boys and tomato clubs for girls into a single program. He also initiated the annual Club Week.

Governor Scott, one of the speakers for this year's program, is a former 4-H boy. Dr. J. H. Hilton, dean of agriculture at State College, who also will speak, was once a 4-H member in Cabarrus County.

Highlight of the week will be the Silver Anniversary party on Tuesday evening, July 24, followed by the tapping of outstanding club boys and girls for membership in the State Honor Club.

A health pageant will be given and the king and queen of health will be crowned on Wednesday evening. The outstanding feature Thursday night will be the annual dress revue presenting the work of 4-H girls. The special week will close with the traditional candle-lighting ceremony on Friday night.

The boys and girls will be guests of Governor and Mrs. Scott at the Mansion on Wednesday. In addition to the demonstrations and livestock judging contests, finals of the 4-H speaking contest will be held during Club Week for the first time.

## Schaub Scholarship Fund Nears \$1,000

With farm families and home demonstration clubs in all parts of the State participating, contributions to the I. O. Schaub Scholarship Fund at

State College are rapidly approaching the \$1,000 mark. It was announced in Raleigh this week.

The fund will be used to help outstanding 4-H Club members studying agriculture at State College. The project is being sponsored by officials of Farm and Home Week in recognition of the many years of services rendered to North Carolina and its farm families by Dr. I. O. Schaub, director of the Agricultural Extension Service for the past 26 years.

This year's Farm and Home Week, to be held July 31-August 3, will be dedicated to Dr. Schaub. Officials hope a minimum of \$5,000 in contributions for the scholarship fund will have been received by that time.

Individuals or families desiring to

contribute may turn the money over to the local county agent or home demonstration agent, or mail it to E. G. Shelton, P. O. Box 5157, State College Station, Raleigh. Shelton is president of the State Farmers Convention.

"Dean" Schaub, as he is affectionately known throughout North Carolina, is a native of Stokes County and a graduate of State College. He served as the State's first 4-H Club agent beginning in 1909, later was Southern States field agent for the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Cooperative Extension Service, and in 1924 became director of the North Carolina Extension Service.

He also was dean of the State College School of Agriculture from 1926

to 1940 and acting director of the North Carolina Experiment Station from 1937 to 1940. He has received numerous honors and has served on many important State and national committees.

## Seven County Fair September 18 To 23

Final preparations are now being made for the Elizabeth City Seven County Agricultural Fair, composed of Pasquotank, Camden, Currituck, Dare, Perquimans, Chowan and Gates Counties, to be held at Elizabeth City September 18-23, according to a statement made by Mrs. Vernon James, of Pasquotank County, who is serving as

general director of exhibits under the general management of Norman Y. Chambliss, of Rocky Mount, veteran fair manager.

Special features will be provided during the entire week, with a pre-opening of the fair on Sunday afternoon, September 17, with a great thrill show. Three children's days will be staged during the week, Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday. A brilliant display of fireworks will be staged every night. Excellent grandstand shows will be provided, featuring local talent in competition from various organizations in the Albemarle section.

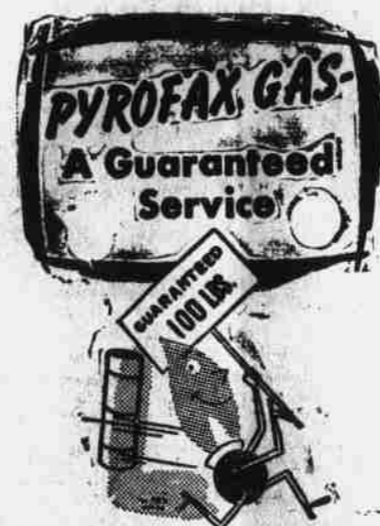
