## **Cotton Allotments Being Mailed To**

Notices of revised farm acreage allotments and marketing quotas for the 1954 crop of upland cotton are being mailed this week by the County ASC Committee to Perquimans County cotton producers reported Holase Nixon, Office Manager of the Perquimans County ASC.

Congress recently amended the act governing determination of national, state, county and farm cotton acreage allotments. The new legislation gives North Carolina an additional 96,193 acres. Nationally, the increase is from 17,910,448 to 21,379,342. As provided in the new legislation the State ASC Committee apportiond additional acreage directly to farms where necessary to provide each farm with an allotment of the larger of (1) 65 per cent of the average planted acreage of cotton for the years 1951, 1952, 1953; or (2) 40 per cent of the highest acreage planted in any one year during such three-year period except that no allotment was increased to more than 50 per cent of the cropland tal increase of 55 acres.
