County Voters Give Majority To Lennon n Election To Determine U. S. Senator

J. Kelly White Wins County Board To Nomination For Office Of Sheriff

Voters of Perunimans County went to the polls last Saturday and cast a commanding majority of votes for Alton A. Lennon, candidate for the U.S. Senate; they also gave a majority to Edwin Gill as candidate for the office of State Treasurer, and Charles Gold, candidate for Commissioner of Insurcentification.

Election day was cloudy, rainy and sunny, but despite the weather voters turned out in a better than expected number, the records showing 1500 votes were cast during the day.

In the contest for U. S. Senate Lennon received a total of 912 votes while W. Kerr Scott, who won the state nomination, received 494. Eleven votes were given to five other candidates as follows: Wingfield 1, Turner 5, Bostick 2, Boyd 2 and Sprinkle one.

In the contest for State Treasurer Perquimans voters gave Gill 726 votes while his opponent. James, received 282. In the race between Gold and Fletcher for the nomination for Commissioner of Insurance, a close race developed in this county. Gold won the nod with 455 votes while Fletcher received 440.

In the only county contest, decided by the election, J. Kelly White defeated incumbent M. G. Owens for the nomination for sheriff. White received an animalism of the works in each
