A new system of mail schedules affecting practically all of Northeastern North Carolina, became effective at the Hertford Post Office last Monday, August 16. Mail which was formerly dispatched both north and south each morning and afternoon, is now dispatched northbound at 7:30 A. M., and southbound at 2:45 and 4 P. M.
