## Six Million Christmas Gifts

The Office of Foreign Operations has already started shipment of over aix million Christmas food parcels from the United States to some forty-four countries in all parts of the world. This is part of a Christmas spirit being demonstrated by the United States to its friends and neighbors this holiday

The packages are made up by the Foreign Operations Administra-tion, and utilize surplus foods obtained from the Department of Agriculture. Some 500,000 of them will be distributed to the armed forced overseas.

The packages are estimated to be worth about \$4.50 each, and con-tain a pound of butter, a pound of

GLORY TO GOD IN THE HIGHEST

International Sunday School Lesson for December 19, 1964.

Memory Selection: "O come, let us worship and bow down; let us kneel before the Lord our Maker."

Lesson Text: Psalm 148:1-3, 11-13; Matthew 1:18-25.

Probably no expressed sentiment does the soul more good than doer the soul more good than praise. Try it. Instead of going about criticizing and finding fault with everybody and everything, change your tune and go about praising and finding something good in everybody and cerything. Not just a Pollyanna attitude, but make a real, honest effort to find something to praise someone for, and you'll be surprised that there is so much good in the world that you had overlooked before.

Our lesson for this week begins on a note of praise, "Praise ye the Lord!" There's so much we have to praise God for it would take a lifetime to accomplish the task. The Psalmist calls on everything in God's creation to sing "Hallelujah." which is the Jewish word for our translation, "Praise ye the Lord."

Christianity has always been a singing religion and it has so much to sing about. Christianity still thinks of God as Creator and Sustainer, like the Psalmist, but it also thinks of God as Savlour. With the return of Christmas, our thoughts turn particularly to the One God's own Son-who came into the world "that all who believed on Him might have everlasting life."

The birth of Jesus was announc ed with a song and, even before that, when the angel Gabriel told Mary she was to be the mother of the long promised Messiah; she broke into song—that beautiful song which we know as the "Magnificat," which begins, "My Soul doth magnify the Lord, and my spirit hath rejoiced in God, my Sav

our" (Luke 1:46-47). Thus, it is hardly to be wonder. ed at that Christmas is a time of singing and has its own special music in the form of the beloved Christmas carols. All of Christendom sings at Christmas-time. Evcarols and each year, as Christmas returns, church choirs and congregations sing these happy songs, commemorating the Saviour's birth. Happy young people often go about from place to place singing these carols for those who are shut-in at homes, in the hospitals and other institutions. It is really a joyou

Some scholars claim that the 148th Psalm is a Messianic Psalm -that is, it contains portions which prophecy the coming of Christ to the world. While others do not agree with this suggestion, th Psalm does contain suggestions and deas which remind us of the story. of the Saviour' birth.

The story of Christ's birth as related by Matthew is very familiar to all of us and, through its very familiarity, some of its message escape us. Probably, however, the best known and best loved account is that by Luke, the physician. The account we have for our consideration today, written by Matthew, omitted is the account of the jour-ney of Mary and Joseph to Bethlehem, their inability to find lodging in the crowded town, and of Jesus' birth in one of the stables in the yard of the inn. Omitted also, is the angels' song, the shepherds visit to the manger and other of the more intimate details with which we are so familiar.

However, Matthew's gospel was written to the Jews, with the purpose of proving to them that Jesus, the son of Mary, was the long promised Messiah of Israel. His account of the Immaculate conception and of Jesus' birth was for tion and of Jesus' birth was for this purpose. Luke's account of Jesus' birth was written from the standpoint of the physician, and this is why so many of the details are included. Too, some scholars believe that Dr. Luke received his information directly from Mary, the mother of Jesus.

The Jews, long captives of the Roman Government, had been look-Roman Government, had been look-ing and longing for one who would free them from their bondage. A Messiah had been promised them and the faithful were still expec-ing the promise to be fulfilled. Their conception of a Saviour, how-ever, was a sort of political cusanej.
