Missionary Union To Hold Institute On Next Tuesday

The Woman's Missionary Union of the Chowan Baptist Association will hold a Stewardship, Community Mission and Mission Study Institute at Cool Spring Baptist Church near Euro, Tuesday, January 25, beginning at 10 o'clock in the morning. Mrs. J. L. Walter Moose of Gatesville will preside.

This annual endeavor, designed to promote the study of mission work in the churches, is sponsored by the Baptist Church women in ten eastern counties, comprising Gates, Chowan, Perquimans, Pasquotank, Camden, Currituck, Washington, Tyrrell, Hyde and Dare.

The Rev. W. D. Morris, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Scotland Neck, will be the featured speaker of the day. Mr. Morris, who recently made a tour of mission points in Alaska, will also lead the adult study group on the mission work in that country. Mrs. Rose Goodwin Pool, Greenville, S. Marvin Pickard, head of the department of music at Chowan College, and a selected group from the college choir, will present the music for the day.

Each of the 60 Baptist churches in this area is urged to send representatives to this meeting.

THIS WEEK'S HEADLINES

A national budget calling for expenditures of more than 62 billion dollars for the fiscal year starting next July 1, was presented to Congress this week by President Eisenhower. Reaction from Congress, according to reports from Washington, was most of the budget will be adopted. About half of the budget is set up for spending for defense. Income for the year has been estimated at \$60 billion leaving a deficit of about 2.8 billion.

Congress is expected to give the budget careful consideration, and reports state some changes in the proposed spending will be made by Congress. The President recommended no changes in tax structure during the year in order to keep income as near the estimate as possible. Predictions are there will be no changes in tax laws.

A \$610 million road program was presented to the State Legislature this week by Governor Hodges, but from Raleigh it is reported the plan, set up by the State Highway Commission, is receiving a cold reception from the General Assembly, possibly due to comments and questions on the program raised by the Governor.

A 10-day war in Costa Rica is under investigation of the Organization of American States. The OAS is reported supporting the Government against the rebels but as yet basis for the trouble has not been established. The U. S. sold Costa Rica four fighting planes this week to be used against rebel planes, and other aid is being supplied through approval of the OAS.

Red Cross Chapter Reorganized Here At Meeting Friday

C. P. Morris Chairman; Plans Discussed For Fund Drive

C. P. Morris was reelected chairman of the Perquimans Chapter of the American Red Cross, at an annual meeting of the group held last Friday at the Municipal Building in Hertford. Other officers reelected during the meeting were Mrs. J. L. Tovey, vice chairman; A. W. Helren, treasurer; C. C. Banks, secretary; Mrs. Lawrence Towns, chairman of the Junior Red Cross.

All committee chairmen were also reelected to serve during the coming year. Miss Barrett, Field Representative for the Red Cross, was present and conducted a discussion on the various programs being carried out by the county chapter. She advised the chapter officers of some of the programs planned by the Red Cross during the coming year, and urged the local organization to map out plans to assure success of these projects.

Discussed during the meeting were plans for the annual fund drive to be conducted in March, and Miss Barrett advised the County quota for 1955 had been reduced to \$1,075. She pointed out that establishment of local fund quotas were based upon three factors: population, money available and experience of giving.

Approximately 21 percent of this quota will be retained in the county for use by the local chapter, while 79 percent will be forwarded to area headquarters for use by the national organization.

Plans for the annual roll call and fund drive are still being formulated, according to Mr. Morris, who announced the chapter is now seeking a chairman to direct the campaign. Henry C. Stokes, Jr., and George Fields, co-directors of the campaign last year, have resigned. It was pointed out during the meeting that major programs carried out by the local chapter include Home Service, which is a major project of the national Red Cross, the blood program, Grants and Loans, and disaster.

Forty-five percent of funds spent by the American Red Cross, according to Miss Barrett, go for Home Service, the big program of assisting and working with armed service personnel.

Chairman Calls For Reports On Dimes

March of Dimes solicitors were reminded this week by Miss Kinsey Perry, fund drive chairman, it is the hope of the committee that the Perquimans drive can be brought to a close on January 31.

Thus far only a few reports have been made on the progress of the March of Dimes campaign, and Miss Perry urges all workers to complete the canvass of their territory, and make reports to her or George Fields, fund treasurer, as soon as possible.

County Farm Bureau To Open Office Here

The N. C. Farm Bureau is opening an office in Hertford, next week, according to J. A. Sutton, where it will handle its insurance business and dispense farm information to Perquimans County farmers. The office will be located in the Hollowell building on Church Street.

Mr. Sutton invites the public to visit the new office for information on farm programs, and the new social security law as it affects farmers.

He reported the Perquimans Farm Bureau met its quota during the membership drive, and received an award for this achievement.

Bloodmobile Falls Short Of Goal Here

Eighteen persons donated blood to the Red Cross Blood Bank, when the Bloodmobile visited Hertford last Monday, it was reported by H. N. Nixon, chairman of the committee for the blood program.

Mr. Nixon said several other volunteer donors appeared to donate blood but upon examination these were turned down, for the present, due to physical conditions. While the bloodmobile fell far short of its goal of 125 pints of blood, the committee felt the shortage of volunteer donors at this visit of the unit was due mostly to lack of time in organizing and publicizing the visit.

Mr. Nixon expresses his, and the committee's thanks to the blood officials in collecting the blood donors who assisted the Red Cross here.

Heavy Snow Fall Hit County Wed.

Old Man Winter gripped Perquimans County again last Wednesday, sending a rain, snow and sleet which caused a slow-down in traffic movement throughout the area.

A snow fell early Wednesday morning, covering the ground with about a two-inch blanket and this was followed by rain, which later changed to a mixture of rain and snow.

Henry C. Stokes, Jr. Named Man Of Year At Jaycee Meeting

Henry C. Stokes, Jr., was presented the Distinguished Service Award by the Hertford Junior Chamber of Commerce, as the Outstanding Young Man of the Year, at the organization's annual birthday and Ladies' Night banquet, which was held last Wednesday night at the VFW hall.

Jarvis Henry, president of the Jaycees, presided over the dinner meeting and Edgar Gurganus, National Jaycee Director, was the guest speaker, and also made the presentation of the service award.

Francis Nixon, winner of the award in 1952, and George Fields, 1953 winner, were recognized following the presentation of the 1954 service emblem.

The Jaycee Young Man of the Year award is made annually, the selection being made by three judges over the 35 year age limit for nominees. This year's selection by the judges was unanimous.

The award is given to the young man the judges believe has contributed most to the welfare of the community during the past 12 months. The selection of Mr. Stokes for the honor this year was based upon his participation and activities in community and civic projects.

A past president of the Hertford Junior Chamber of Commerce, Stokes is now vice president of the 10th District of the N. C. Junior Chamber of Commerce; as such he travels about 10 counties in Eastern North Carolina, encouraging better fellowship among the Jaycees and people of these communities.

Rev. Oscar Creech Speaks Sunday At Baptist Ordination

One of the most distinguished ministers in North Carolina will be the guest speaker at the Hertford Baptist Church this Sunday evening. He is the Rev. Oscar Creech, above, of Ahoskie and the occasion of his coming will be the ordination of two newly elected deacons in the Baptist Church.

Mr. Creech is a native of Johnston County. In 1928, after leaving Wake Forest College, he went to Nash County where he was to remain until 1939 in school work. He entered the Baptist Ministry in 1935 and served both as minister and educator until 1923. In 1925 he accepted a call to the First Baptist Church in Ahoskie, and remained there for nearly 27 years. Upon his recent retirement, Mr. Creech became the associate to the president of Chowan College and he holds that position at the present. Having distinguished himself in the fields of religion and education, Rev. Creech is widely known in many parts of the country, so he is no stranger in Hertford.

The service at which Mr. Creech is to speak will be an ordination service for Carroll Williams and Tommy P. Byrum, who were recently elected to the high honor of deacons. This service will include the traditional "laying on of hands," a custom used by the early Christian Church and still practiced in most Baptist churches. All friends of the Hertford Baptists are invited to attend this deeply significant and impressive service.
