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HOW TO BAKE A HAM

Place ham fat side up on a rack in a pan with 2-inch high sides. Insert a meat thermometer into the center of the ham. Allow 15 minutes for each pound. Use no water and no cover on the pan. Heat in a slow oven, 325 degrees, according to following cooking schedule. Allow time for glazing in a hot oven, 400 degrees, for 15 to 20 minutes. If there is a salt on ham, remove all of it. Spread ham with a glaze of brown, currant, jelly, orange, peach or apricot marmalade. Return to hot oven, 400 degrees, for 15 to 20 minutes. Return to hot oven, 400 degrees, for 15 to 20 minutes.
