The Rev. H. M. Jamieson, speaking on behalf of the proponents in the situation, stated there were no complaints against the owner of any store but the entire matter was based upon observance of the Sabbath. W. E. Dail also addressed the Commissioners in behalf of the petitioners, seeking passage of a law to curtail store operations on Sunday.

The group seeking the Board's approval for introduction of the bill stated they had conferred with Mr. Holmes, County Representative, and sought ways and means to have such a bill passed in order that church services might not be interrupted by disturbances adjacent to church property.

After considerable consideration, the Commissioners deferred action on the request to allow it further time to study the situation as it exists at New Hope and to ascertain the feelings of the general public concerning a bill of this nature, calling for all stores within
