The problem is even more vital to the poultry producer now than ever before because the public is becoming more "quality" conscious as far as eggs are concerned.

Dr. Dearstyne points out the internal quality desired by the consumer includes a high per cent of firm white albumin and an up-standing yolk. These usually are present in the freshly laid eggs.

Albumin only very slowly at temperatures below 50 degrees. However, at temperatures over 80 degrees, this conversion is rapid.

At high temperatures, the yolk flattens out very quickly and the interior quality of the egg goes downhill rapidly. The humidity of the holding room is also important because eggs lose moisture very rapidly in a dry atmosphere. This increases the size of the air cell in the egg and indicates age.
