




NAVY TAKING GRASSHOPPERS TO ANTARCTIC





other instruments record and transmit air temperature, pressure and relative humidity, Under study since 1942, was developed by the Naval Research Laboratory in D. C.



In upright position, the "Grasshopper" is ready to shoot a 25-foot antenna into the air. Using a 12-volt wet cell battery it can send periodic radio weather reports as far as 800 miles for 60 days. Navy tests in the Antarctic are expected to bring the robot to perfectly.
