Sale of beer within North Carolina during the last year resulted in higher taxes being collected than the previous 12 months. Counties and towns sharing in the distribution of the tax pool received greater returns than last year.

Perquimans County received a total of \$6,417.17 from the pool this year; some \$800 more than was received in 1954. The Town of Hertford received \$1,854, an increase of about \$200 over last year.
