Foreign Policy Debate—The Great Missile Race—Russia Ahead Of U. S.?

Washington—Secretary of State John Foster Dulles has touched off, indirectly, the greatest foreign policy debate of this election year. By allowing a magazine writer to attribute him a heretofore undisclosed policy, said to have been used on at least three occasions while dealing with the Communists, Dulles has placed himself in the middle of a furor on Capitol Hill.

Some solons were frankly surprised at the assertions in the article. They had known nothing of this so-called "brink-of-war" foreign policy the United States is supposed to have employed in Korea, in the Formosa crisis and in the Indochinese crisis.

Some of the Senators and Congressmen who raised their eyebrows were in a position to know all that Congress had been told on these crises. Their comment was restrained, but they expressed surprise, on some occasion, at the tone of the latest claims from Mr. Dulles.

The Secretary implies in the new appraisal that this country made a thinly-veiled threat, passed on to Communist channels, to go into action with nuclear weapons if a settlement was not possible in Korea. The same threat is reported to have been successfully employed in the other two crises.

The implication is clear; it is that this get-tough policy on the Eisenhower Administration forced the Communists to terms, and won diplomatic victories for the United States. If the threat was used as the writer claims, then this policy has been generally unknown to the American people.

Democrats are now complaining that if the government is using the Big Stick policy in its relations with the Communists, the people should at least be given the facts, and acquainted with decisions which could immediately and unexpectedly involve them in an all-out war with Communism.

Others say that our allies are not being consulted fully on this "brink-of-war" policy and that this oversight is causing much misunderstanding among our friends abroad. Others are saying that the magazine article gives an inaccurate impression, which could well be true, since Secretary Dulles did not vouch for the accuracy of the article, when pressed on this point.

The one sure result is that the "brink-of-war" policy is certain to be debated hotly between now and November. Some Democrats think Dulles went overboard and tripped himself up. Meanwhile, a number of Republicans hail the article as a revelation of bold and successful foreign policy as employed by President Eisenhower and Dulles to get us out of the Korean War and prevent trouble in two other areas.

There is no longer any doubt that there is an all-out race for the long-sought intercontinental missile between this country and Russia. Latest intelligent reports in Washington are disquieting.

There are some who even think Russia has pulled ahead of the U. S., which has been doing much research and planning, but delaying attempts to build the 5,000-mile rocket missile, which will carry a hydrogen bomb until success is in view.

It is said the Reds already have a 1,500-mile missile. They expect to have the 5,000-mile weapon within two years, according to reports. The United States will not have such a weapon earlier and may not have it then, unless progress comes fast. The emphasis now is on progress, fast progress. The weapon involved may hold the key to existence in a new war.

The two most influential men in the Eisenhower Administration are said to be Sherman Adams and George Humphrey. Adams is the designated Chief of Staff for the President and actually ran the country when the President was completely incapacitated recently.

BOND ORDER AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$125,000 SCHOOL BONDS OF THE COUNTY OF PERQUIMANS WHEREAS, the County Board of Education of the County of Perquimans has determined that existing school plant facilities in the Perquimans County School Administrative Unit are not adequate for the maintenance of public schools for the nine months' school term prescribed by law, and has requested the Board of Commissioners to provide the sum of \$125,000 to finance the additional school plant facilities which are described in Section 1 of this bond order and which said County Board of Education has determined are necessary to enable the County of Perquimans, as an administrative agency of the public school system of the State of North Carolina, to maintain public schools in said Perquimans County School Administrative Unit for the nine months' school term prescribed by law; NOW, THEREFORE,
BE IT ORDERED by the Board of Commissioners of the County of Perquimans, as follows:
Section 1. The Board of Commissioners of the County of Perquimans, as an administrative agency of the public school system of the State of North Carolina, to maintain public schools in said school administrative unit for the nine months' school term prescribed by law, and that it will be necessary to expend for such purpose not less than \$125,000 in addition to other moneys which have been made available therefor.

Section 2. In order to raise the money required to finance the cost of erecting said new school building and of acquiring such land and furnishings and equipment, bonds of the County of Perquimans are hereby authorized and shall be issued pursuant to The County Finance Act of North Carolina. The maximum aggregate principal amount of said bonds authorized by this bond order shall be One Hundred and Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$125,000).

Section 3. A tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds when due shall be annually levied and collected.

Section 4. A statement of the County debt of the County of Perquimans has been filed with the Clerk of the Board of Commissioners of said County and is open to public inspection.

Section 5. This bond order shall take effect when approved by the voters of the County at an election as provided in said Act.

The foregoing bond order has been introduced and a sworn statement has been filed under the County Finance Act, showing the assessed valuation of the County to be \$8,213,144., and the net debt for school purposes, including the proposed bonds, to be \$284,000. A tax will be levied for the payment of the proposed bonds and interest, if the same shall be issued. Any citizen or taxpayer may protest against the issuance of such bonds at a meeting of the Board of Commissioners to be held at the regular meeting place of said Board in the County Court House in Hertford, North Carolina, at 10 o'clock, A. M., on the 7th day of February, 1956, or an adjournment thereof.
