

### Holds Training Meeting For Local Committeemen

Farmers Home Administration County Committeemen from Camden, Rowan, Currituck, Dare, Pasquotank and Perquimans Counties gathered in Hertford October 2, for a county committee training meeting at which time the recently enacted legislation which provides broader authority to assist family-type farmers with loans to improve and operate their farms was discussed and the duties of the committeemen in connection with the making of the loans was outlined.

D. G. Modlin, area supervisor, was in charge of the meeting and discussed the objectives of the Farmers Home Administration program and the types of loans available to eligible farmers in this area. Modlin pointed out that the objective of the Farmers Home Administration is to establish farm families in a sound system of farming by the extension of needed credit, that the credit needs of eligible farmers can be met through the Farm Ownership, Farm Housing, Soil and Water Conservation, Operating and Emergency Loan programs.

The eligibility and qualifications of applicants for FHA loans was also discussed by Mr. Modlin. He pointed out that the applicant must be unable to obtain the necessary credit from other sources on terms and conditions that he can reasonably be expected to repay. The applicant must be a bona fide farmer with experience as a farm operator or manager or a veteran with previous farming experience.

Mr. Modlin also pointed out that the family has the responsibility of refinancing their FHA indebtedness when they have progressed to the point they are able to obtain the necessary credit from other sources.

Ralph W. Turner, farm management specialist of the State office, discussed the family-type farm and the less than family-type farm. He pointed out that the family-type farm is becoming larger and that the FHA now has authority to assist family-type operators with a full-time hired hand. Mr. Turner

also pointed out that the agency's soil and water conservation loan and the farm housing loan can be made to operators of larger than family-type farms while the farm ownership and operating loans are limited to family-type or less than family-type operators.

Loan purposes, loan limitations and refinancing of debts was also discussed by Mr. Turner. He pointed out that any loan made must meet the objectives of the Farmers Home Administration and that the County Committee has the responsibility of determining if a particular applicant is eligible for the loan for which he has applied.

Farm families or others desiring further information about the services available through the Farmers Home Administration should contact the local office of the Farmers Home Administration or any of the County Committeemen in their county.

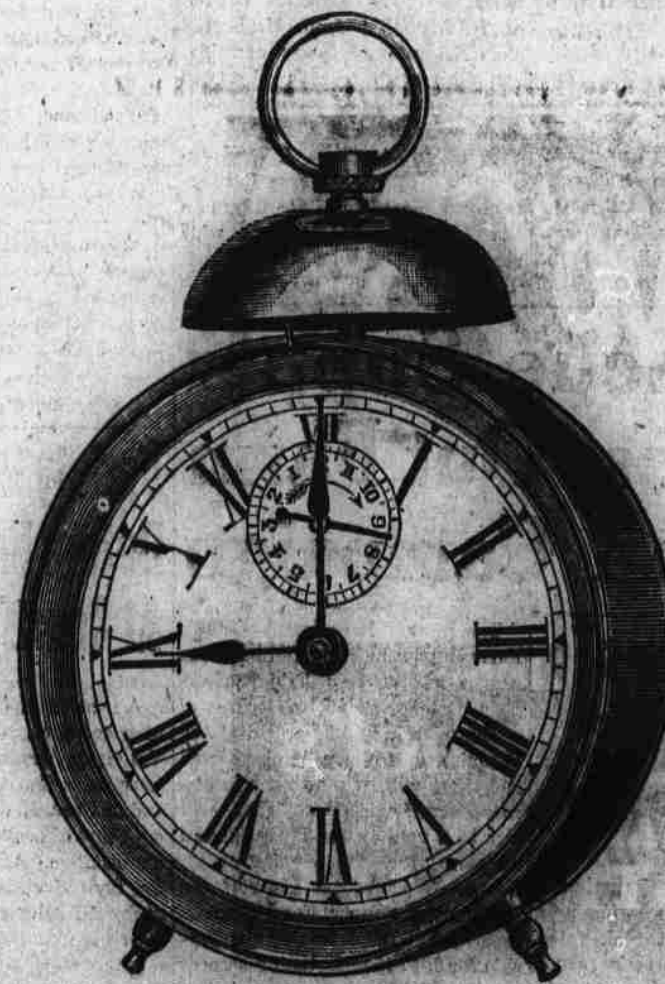

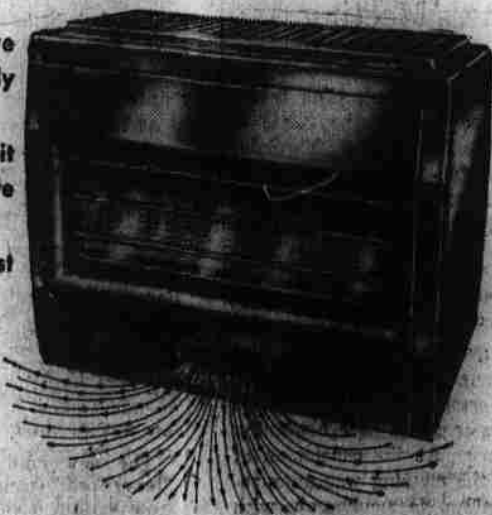
