

Service Officer Offers Advice On Veteran Benefits

On October 31, 1956 the Veterans Administration mailed to all widows, guardians of children, and parents of veterans who died as a result of military or naval service an application for the payment of benefits under the new Servicemen's and Veterans' Survivor Benefits Act. Accompanying this application is a pamphlet setting forth the benefits under the new law.

The North Carolina Veterans Commission urges all survivors who receive these applications to withhold action in completing the forms until they are thoroughly familiar with the benefits to which they are entitled. The new law is not effective until January 1, 1957 and all eligible persons have until July 3, 1957 to make up their minds to apply, and the increases, if any, will date back to January 1, 1957.

Once an eligible survivor chooses to accept benefits under the new law such a choice becomes final and may not be changed at a later date for any reason.

Widows, guardians of children and dependent parents of veterans whose death resulted from service are requested to contact C. C. Banks, Veterans Service Officer, Hertford, North Carolina, or the District Office, North Carolina Veterans Commission, Elizabeth City, North Carolina in order that these benefits may be thoroughly discussed before action is taken to complete an application.
