

Small Business Loans Boosted To \$100,000

James P. Moore, Regional Director of the Small Business Administration for this area has announced that he has been authorized to approve small business loans to \$100,000 on his own authority. A bank is taking a 25 per cent participation provided further that such participation shall represent not less than 50 per cent in new money. Previously SBA Regional Director had authority to approve such participation loans only up to \$50,000 and direct loans, those made directly by the Government without bank participation, up to \$50,000. Applications for loans in excess of \$100,000 will continue to be forwarded to SBA's Washington Office for final action.


