

Annual Wool Pool Set Next Monday

Monday, June 22, is the day for the wool pool to be held in Washington, N. C. To assist the many farmers in Perquimans County that have only a few pounds of wool, these farmers will have an opportunity to put all their wool together on one truck on Saturday morning from 8 until 11 at the Agricultural Building in Hertford. This wool should be properly tagged with the farmer's name and address and packed in peanut bags. The prices for the wool this year are as follows: Less 1c per pound for handling: Clear wool, 47.41; coarse wool, 44.21; short and lamb's wool, 32.31; light burry wool, 45.21; medium burry wool, 40.21; heavy burry wool, 36.21; stained, black or dead wool, 35.21.

Please try to have your wool in Hertford as soon after 8:00 A. M. as possible, because there may have to be other arrangements made for hauling.

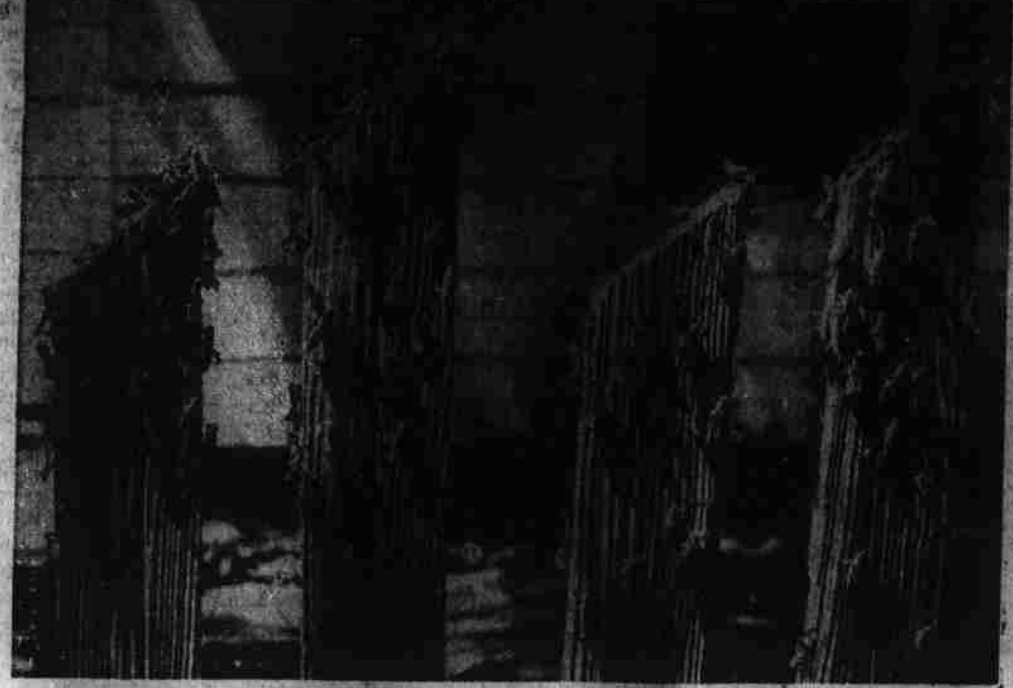
