The readers of the Weekly, especially young men and women, should not be misled in this respect. They should realize that worthwhile success in life is achieved almost exclusively through personal endeavor.

After all is said and done, the vast majority of business successes owe their growth to one or more rare individuals who give to the enterprise a contribution that includes, not only physical effort, but superior intelligence and the wisdom that arises from the intangible living that we call "character."

Days To Remember

The last week in May contains, among other interesting days, Memorial Day, which falls on May 30. But this is not the only day to be remembered.

Back in 1898 the President called for 90,000 volunteers for the Spanish-American War, the war which resulted in our defeat of Spain and acquisition of the Philippines, Guam and other possessions and Cuba's independence.

That war was not popular, especially in some of the more northern sections of the country, but was supported to a great degree in the southern portions of the United States—those nearer Cuba, where a tyrannical government was oppressing the people to a repulsive degree.

On the 26th the North American Bank was established, back in 1781, and on the 27th, in the dark days of the mid-thirties, the Supreme Court declared the NRA unconstitutional. It was after this Supreme Court action that President Roosevelt threatened to "pack" the highest court.

That fight lasted for the better part of a year, and by a narrow margin, President Roosevelt's plan to add additional members to the Supreme Court was defeated. It is interesting to note that dissatisfaction today with the highest court has resurrected some of the schemes proposed in the 1930's by New Deal officials.

On the 29th, Wisconsin became one of the states of the Union, back in 1848, and this day is observed in Wisconsin. The next day, the 30th, is Memorial Day, which is de-

signed as a remembrance of those who died in so many U. S. wars.

It is interesting to speculate on future Memorial Days, for a war in this nuclear age would undoubtedly cause more casualties, perhaps in a few days, than we have suffered in all the wars to date. Let us hope, then, that Memorial Day in the years ahead will not be neglected.

The 31st is remembered as the day of the Johnstown flood, which occurred in 1889, and was one of the worst floods in the history of the United States. And for those who want to remember May 30 for something in addition to Memorial Day, they can remember that on this day Voltaire died in 1778.

Sunday School Lesson

WE ARE NOT ALONE

International Sunday School Lesson for May 31, 1959.

Memory Selection: "The Lord is the stronghold of my life: of whom shall I be afraid?" —(Psalms 27:1).

Lesson Text: 1 Kings 18:29 through 19:18.

This lesson purports to show that in spite of our discouragement God never forsakes us; it also points out the strength that comes from fellowship with other faithful Christians.

Why are Christians never alone in fighting evil forces? In studying our Scriptures today, and reading of Elijah's experience, maybe we can find an answer to this question.

Elijah's cry that he alone was left of the prophets of the Lord sounds like the cry of a discouraged man, and that is exactly what it was. Elijah found himself the only active leader in the struggle against Baalism. Elijah had fled, discouraged and dejected, to Mount Horeb, and as he hid in the cave he became conscious of the presence of God, and was moved to explain his presence there. In effect, what Elijah was saying was "Lord, I am very frightened."

He is not the first individual who has been frightened because he felt that he was the lone defender of the right. But God did not coddle Elijah in his mood of despondency. Instead, he responded with a summons to action. Action lifted Elijah out of his mood of despondency. How many times has God done the same thing for us? Everything may be going beautifully in our lives; then a sudden calamity overtakes us and upsets the ordered pattern of our days. Our first reaction is often one of self-pity. What have we ever done to deserve such a thing as this thing that has happened to us? But gradually we recover from the blow. We begin casting around in our minds for ways in which we can overcome this terrible thing that has befallen us. And in decisive action, we find comfort. When it is all over, we tend to congratulate ourselves. If we would only pause a moment and look deeper into our solution to so many of our troubles, we might often be surprised to find the fine hand of God behind it all. "Not a sparrow falleth . . ." is a very comforting thought isn't it?

Life, especially the spiritual life, does not proceed on an even keel. There will be times when we experience mounting excitement. It may be followed by a sense of despair when we feel that we are in the lowest depths. It is in those moments we can turn to the source of power as Elijah did, then we shall find succor and comfort.

There are times when we believe that we are indeed the only people who care very much about fighting for what is right and decent. We need in those moments to draw upon divine strength, but we also need to take careful stock of the situation, and ponder on what can be done about it. Just as Elijah became aware that there were seven thousand others who had not submitted to Baalism, so we may find others who think and believe as we do.

God has put help at our hands in many ways. There will be many times that we will become discouraged as we live out our lives on this earth. We will often feel that we need to talk things over with someone. It may be the pastor, the chairman of our group, or a fellow member. To know that there are others with the same troubles and ideals that we ourselves have, and to discover that there are others who recognize their own weaknesses, will help us in evaluating our own situation.

When we are discouraged we look on the most hopeful aspects of the picture. Sometimes the hole of despair in which we find ourselves is so deep and dark that we can see no glimmer of light. It is then that a friend can assist us in making a more objective evaluation of our particular situation than we can alone.

And finally, we can sustain each other through mutual concern and prayer. Prayer is our means of communication with God, and from the sense of closeness with him that prayer gives us, we can draw comfort and strength to face whatever is before us.
