

Produce Firm Asks Watermelon Men To Check Market

Fred G. Logan, manager of Farm Fresh Foods, Inc., announced that the market facilities there can greatly improve the usual method of marketing watermelons in this area.

Mr. Logan urges growers to contact Farm Fresh Foods for information on the watermelon situation before offering their melons for sale. The growers, through the services offered by Farm Fresh Foods can line up the best buyers of melons, so that by orderly marketing, the grower can obtain a fair price for his entire crop, rather than to sell his best melons at a fair price and then be unable to find a market for the remainder of his watermelons.

He pointed out that the buying connections of Farm Fresh Foods will offer protection to the grower and also assure the buyers of good quality melons. Buyers of melons are in daily contact with Farm Fresh Foods and growers can be assured of the highest market price for all melons in any quantity offered by each grower.

He also stated that Farm Fresh Foods is seeking growers of fall snapbeans to be planted between July 15 and August 1. Attractive contracts, approved by the N. C. Department of Agriculture, are now being offered to fall growers by Farm Fresh Foods, and Manager Logan urges growers to contact him before

planting their small grain, land in other crops. Snapbeans should provide a greater profit than soybeans, according to Logan, and arrangements are being made with the N. C. Employment Service to provide labor for picking these beans if there is a shortage of local labor when these beans are ready for harvest, Logan stated.
