MINUTES OF MEETING BOARD OF EDUCATION

The Perquimans County Board of Education met in special session Thursday, March 3, 1960. All members were present.

Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

After much consideration of the information accumulated through study and conferences with members of the Division School Planning, the chairman appointed a committee, consist-

ing of C. C. Chappell, D. H. Eure, George Caddy and Supt. J. T. Biggers to meet with the Board of County Commissioners on Monday, March 7, 1960, for the purpose of presenting a proposal that will complete project number five of the school building program as outlined in the building survey of February, 1954.

In a preliminary discussion of the 1960-61 school budget, the superintendent was authorized to include in the Special School Fund Budget \$4,817.23, the amount necessary to match the allotment to Perquimans County by the National Defense Education Act, in order to improve instruction in science, mathematics and modern foreign language.

Some other items of the budget were discussed. However, final approval was deferred until the next meeting.

Request for bus route extension was approved in the case of Fred Forehand, a distance of 1.1 mile, but was refused in the

request of Hertford Beach, a distance of 0.4 of a mile.

Mrs. Mary Onella Brinn was appointed to represent Perquimans County on the "Committee of 100 for Better Schools".

It is the desire of the Perquimans County Board of Education to revise and formulate a set of policies that will be used as guiding principles in all administrative regulations.

As a start in this direction the following policies were adopted:

1. The election of currently employed principals shall be held not later than the regular meeting in April.

2. The election of currently employed teachers shall be held not later than the regular meeting in May.

3. All personnel employed on a twelve months basis shall be given a two weeks vacation with pay each fiscal year, plus the following holidays with pay: Labor Day, Thanksgiving and the following Friday, December 24, 25 and 26, and July 4.

The superintendent shall have the authority to approve vacation schedules.
