

SENATOR SAM ERVIN SAYS



Washington — Last week the Senate passed a resolution to transfer the time being the authority of the Senate Rackets Committee to the Senate Permanent Investigating Subcommittee.

Wise Step—This was a wise move. You will recall that I advocated the extension of the authority of the committee in last week's column. The Rackets Committee, a select committee of the Senate, expired on the last day of March. There was a pressing need for some action to continue its authority and the decision to transfer that authority to the Subcommittee will be helpful. Senator McClellan is head of the Subcommittee as well as the full Government Operations Committee of which the Subcommittee is a part. I am also a member of both the full committee and the subcommittee.

Public Works Projects—During the coming week I expect to appear before the Public Works Subcommittee of the Committee on Appropriations in behalf of funds for river and harbor projects in North Carolina. Projects of this nature are very important to the development of

our economy and are long-range in scope. While projects in this category are often called "pork barrel" legislation, I think the attitude of the people of this country has changed greatly in favor of projects for conservation and development of our resources. The chairman of the Appropriations Subcommittee is Senator Ellender of Louisiana, a friend of the proper developments in our country. Before any project can be authorized and appropriations made, it must run a hard road of close scrutiny by many people. This is one area where haphazard planning is at a minimum.

School Visits—This is the period of the year when thousands of high school youths visit Washington. Many of these groups favor me with a visit. I always look forward to meeting the young men and women because they reflect the vitality and vigor of North Carolina. One of the favorite visiting places is the Federal Bureau of Investigation. The demands for tours of the FBI are so great that school groups planning visits to Washington during the rush season should write many months in advance for reservations.

Civil Rights—Reflecting upon the civil rights bill passed by the Senate, I am convinced that its importance is found in what the bill does not contain as a result of Senate debate.

For example, the Senate struck down such proposals as the resurrection of the harsh Part III (also voted down in 1957), the endorsement of the Supreme Court's 1954 school desegregation decision as the law of the land, and the plans to give statutory authority to the so-called "little FEPC" which would have been a means of getting the camel's nose under the tent.

The Senate procedure and extended debate proves that there is no substitute for deliberate study of far-reaching proposals. I trust that fact is indelibly imprinted upon the Senate of the United States.
