

Soybean Sprouting Into Big Business For Tar Heel State

Forty-five Counties In State Now Have Over 1,000 Acres In Production

More than half a million Tar Heel acres are expected to be planted in soybeans this year. This remarkable bean is earning well its nickname—"the wonder crop". And Tar Heel farmers are finding out it's a lot more than a soil conditioner. Last year, farm income from soybeans in the state was more than \$20 million. Production was about 9.6 million bushels, and only a million stayed on the farm for use in enriching the soil or feeding to animals.

Five million bushels were sold for export, two million to processing plants, 1.6 million to other states. "North Carolina is one of the top producing states in the Southeast," says George Spain. He's a field crops specialist at N. C. State College. "We're coming up fast; but we're far being the top state in acreage, which is Illinois with five million acres."

Indiana, Minnesota, Iowa and Arkansas put about 2.5 million acres in soybeans, while Mississippi and Ohio are over a million. Spain says the farmer has to shoot for above-average yields to make a decent profit on soybeans. "If a farmer can get 30 to 32 bushels per acre, at \$2 a bushel he'll average \$38 in profit per acre," he says. "There are not allotments on soybeans, and the crop is fully mechanized. He shouldn't have to spend more than eight and a half hours per acre." The state average yield last year was 22 bushels per acre. That's a long way from the record set in a five-county contest around New Bern: 56.3 bushels (60 pounds to the bushel). "There are several certified yields of 50 bushels per acre in the state," says Spain. "We've got a '50-bushel soybean club' to emphasize the practices needed for efficient production of soybeans, encourage top quality and to help farmers utilize the crop to its maximum potential." Membership awards go to outstanding producers. Beaufort County has the biggest acreage—40,450—in soybeans. Two producers there have more than 5,000 acres each in the beans. But the soybean isn't exclusively a Coastal Plain crop—mountainous Burke County has more than 2,000 acres in the beans. There are 45 counties in the state with more than 1,000 acres in production, 28 of them with more than 5,000 acres. "Most Tar Heel soybeans sell well above the support price."

On May 28, 1960 some of the citizens of North Carolina, by right of vote, will select your Governor for the coming four years. For the allocation of this money, he depends upon the Appropriations Committee, but as Director of the Budget he controls the spending. To set up such a tax program and to meet the responsibility of directing the appropriations of the money raised by such a program, the candidate elected should have had experience in these major fields of our Government. 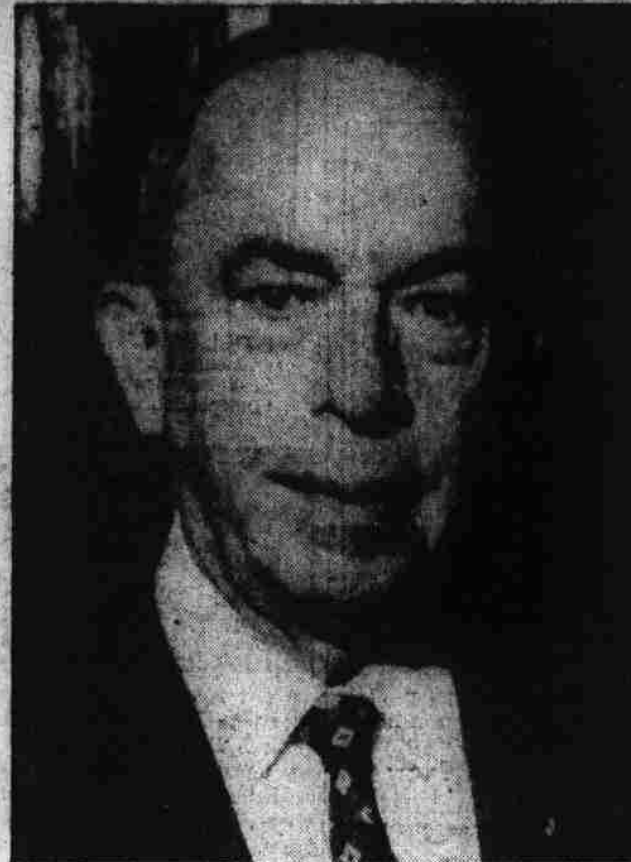
