

Indians Lose 6-4 to Davidson Nine

Central High School of Davidson County handed the Perquimans Indians two straight defeats to win the State Class 2-A baseball championship for 1960. Both games were played in Lexington.

In winning the second contest, Central unloaded a six-run bombardment in the second inning after two batters were out. Rhodes singled for Central and Chappell, pitching for Perquimans, walked two and Pittman binged out a double to score two and an Indian error accounted for two more.

Rhodes was the winning pitcher, who gave up only one hit to Perquimans. Pete Hunter for a two base hit in the seventh. Hunter was the only member of the Indians who hit safely during the series.

Perquimans, Eastern champs, scored one run in the third on three walks and an error and tallied another in the fourth on the same combination. A walk, a stolen base and an error accounted for the third run in the sixth. An error and Hunter's double scored the final Perquimans run.

Rhodes was relieved in the fourth inning by Larry Beck while Chappell was relieved as Indian pitcher by Hunter in the seventh.
