Mrs. Roy Goodwin, McCain, said, "From a large tin can, we cut out a planter which we assembled in a frame, filled it with greenery and placed it on an attractive, handmade bamboo mat."

The seats for the table were made from five-gallon metal buckets, with tops padded and covered with water proof, striped awning material," says Miss Josephine Hall, home economics agent. "The club women made the whole set without a minute of man power."
