

International Sunday School Lesson for January 15, 1961.

Memory Selection: "For God sent the Son Into, the world, not to condemn the world, but that the world might be saved through him." (John 3:77).

Lesson Text: John 3.

In studying the lesson out-ined for us today, each of us as an adult Christian will want to consider this question: What may the new birth mean for me? As we come to the third les-son in this series dealing with the work of Christ as set forth in the Gospel of John, we need, to recall, in capsule form, the ath we have already traveled. We have seen that the Gospel tresses four great themes revelation, incarnation, new birth (regeneration) and new life. Jesus is interpreted as one who reveals God and brings abundant

In last week's lesson we saw what the gospel writer under stood the new life to be. It is a life of fellowship with God and Christ, a life of belief, a life of love, and a life of joy. It is a life which abides through changing circumstances and emerges vitorious over the tribulations of experience. It is, in short, a God-centered life. A the gospel writer so eloquently states: "Jesus as the Christ can bring this new life to you!"

Today's lesson follows natural-

ly from this point. If there is he possibility of newness of life, how does one enter into it? What are the conditions in terms of which we qualify for it? The author of this Gospel has evidently thought deeply about these matters, and speaks to the questions we raise. In the unforgettable story of Nicodemus he drives home his point-there must be a new person if there is to be a new life! To be born anew, one must pass from walking in darkness to walking in light. The new birth is not imposed upon anyone. It emerge through a vital relationship in which the individual responds in faithfulness to the Spirit of Christ. In terms of the pew birth, the individual is a new person in a spiritual sense. Every individual is an entity, and individual in his own right, with different thought processes different standards, different backgrounds and different approaches to any given set of circumstances. Bearing this in mind, there are still some fundamental steps along the way of spiritual rebirth which all ChrisIt's easy to jump. Just leave the solid trail behind you and soar into space.

But before you jump-learn how to land! One man can alight gracefully and continue his course. Another will wrap his skis around his head and end up in the hospital.

There are important life-decisions we often describe as "taking the leap." Going to college, choosing a career, getting married—these are just a few. And these "leaps" lead to happiness for some—and tragedy for others.

The Church with its program of worship and religious education makes essential contri-butions to our life. For what happens after our major "leaps" depends on the character which has been instilled in us, and on the principles by which we live.

The Church prepares us for the leaps we are going to take by teaching us how to land happily, and to continue a right course through-out life.

costs were up again in the past month. That means they cose, record high, in spite of the recession we are in-and have been in for some months now. Living costs cannot continue

to go up while the economy remains depressed, without causing severe hardship to many lower and lower middle class families. Already there are better than four millions unemployed and every increase in living costs is a blow to these Americans.

Yet there is reason to believe that a gradual increase in the cost of living is to be expected as normal. What is needed - if this trend is not to be harmfulis a steady, even if small, rise in income.

This has been achieved in most of the recent years under the Eisenhower administrationthough the farmer has come off unusually badly in this matter of annual net income increase.

Nevertheless, as long as the people's net income can be increased, even modestly, annually, cost of living increases will not be as disturbing as they appear on the surface. For if the economy is to experience a gradual inflation-which it has ever since the Revolution - then costs of living will inch up as earnings of the average American inch up. One will offset the other.

Second, we need to have a clear and sharp vision of the new life God brings through Christ. One comes to an awareness of a possibility he had never sensed before.

Third, we must know sincere repentance. This does not necessarily mean self-rejection; it merely means sincere regret for having made so little of life heretofore, or having lived on lower levels. In the light of the new and finer vision one looks to the past saying, "I shall do something better, and be something better."

And, lastly, one must have a sense of responsible decision The new birth is marked by the exercise of the power to choose. One chooses to respon with all his being to God. To live life in the light of the highest that one has come to know about God is the sincere purpose of the Christian.

After these initial steps have been taken, there is still ample m for growth.

However, having taken these steps, one has a new direction for his life, and a new dedication in that life. He has been born on a new level of experience. It has been the experience of countiess numbers among us that coming to know Jesus as the Christ has led them to this new birth we seek. He has re-vealed people to themselves, in-spiring in them a sense of need. Be thus revealed to them a vision of what life might be. He has inspired repentance, and despert dedication and purpose.
