

## Public Hearings Being Called For Bridges in Area

Highway Commission Chairman Merrill Evans has announced two public hearings on proposed bridges across the Roanoke River for Monday and Tuesday of next week.

Evans' announcement is the result of action taken by the Commission's Bridge Committee, composed of Commissioners Graham Elliott of Washington, Worth Joyner of Rocky Mount, and Gilliam Wood of Edenton.

The public hearing for a proposed bridge from the Plymouth area to Bertie County will be Monday, September 25, 1961, at 2:30 P. M., in the Washington

County Court House, Plymouth. The public hearing for a proposed bridge from the Hertford area of Martin County to the Lewiston area of Bertie County will be held Tuesday, September 26, 1961, at 10:00 A. M., in the Oak City High School auditorium, Oak City, N. C.

The committee's action in providing the hearings came after many requests of citizens in the area for the consideration of two proposed bridges. The public is invited to attend the two hearings and all persons interested in making a statement in connection with the proposed bridges will be given the opportunity to do so.

Chairman Evans and Commissioners Elliott, Wood and Joyner will be present for the hearings, and also planning to attend are Director W. F. Babcock, Chief Engineer C. W. Lee, and Public Relations Officer Roger R. Jackson, Jr.

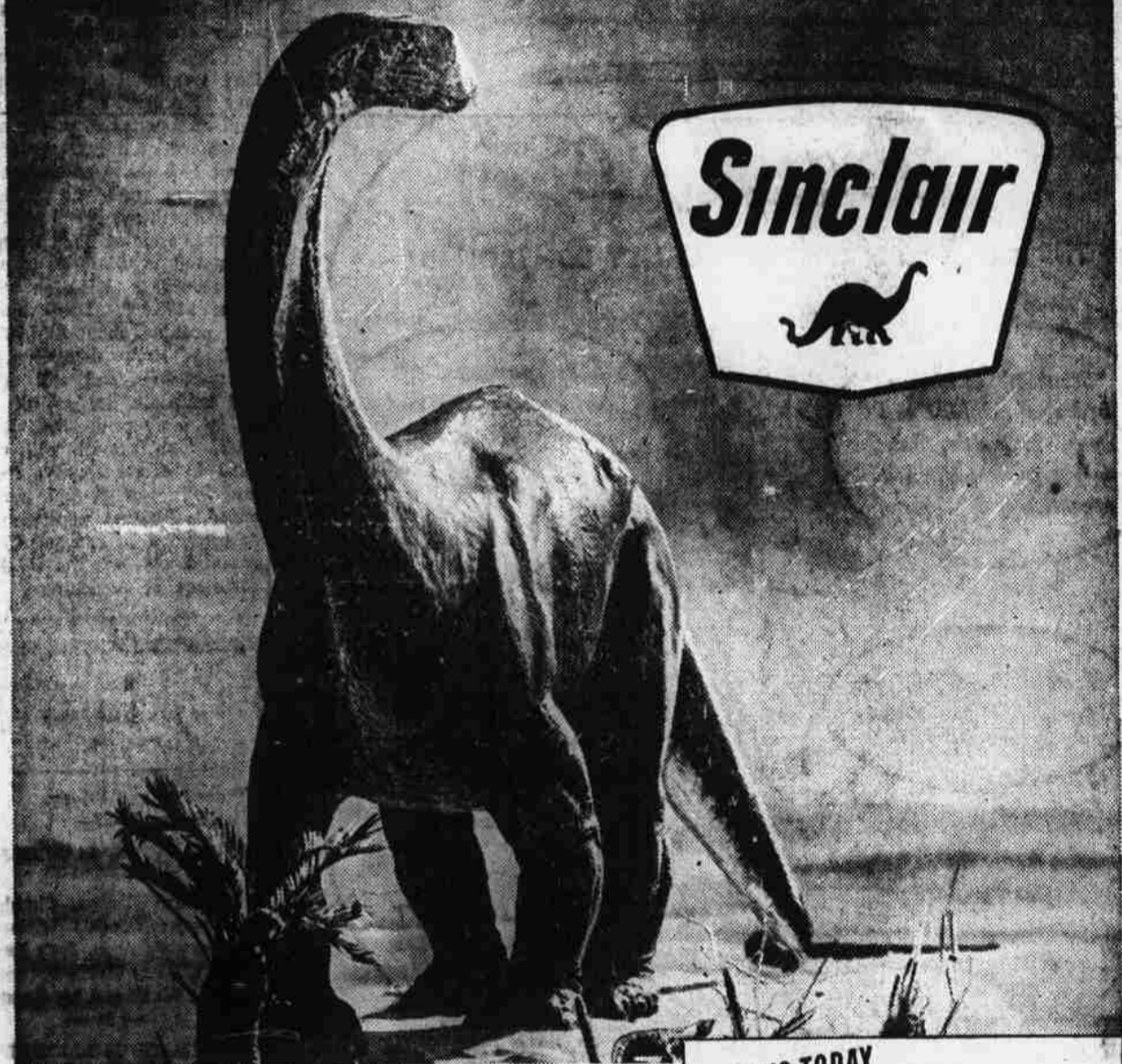
