LITERARY WILL

Charles Lounsbury, a comparatively unknown Chicago lawyer of the old school who died quite some time ago, wrote one of the most beautiful wills that has ever been written. Although he had no property of monetary value to leave to others, he left a legal document which appeals to all lovers of literature. No one can read his will without sensing the esthetic ideals of the writer. His language is clear and beautiful.

That which follows is his entire will:

"In the name of God, amen, I, Charles Lounsbury, being of sound and disposing mind and memory, do now make and publish this my Last Will and Testament, in order, as justly as I may, to distribute my interests in the world among succeeding men.

"And first, that part of my interests which is known among

men and recognized in the sheep-bound volumes of the law as my property, being inconsiderable and of none account, I make no account of in this my will.

"My right to live, it being but a life estate is not at my disposal, but, these things expected all else in the world I now proceed to devise and bequeath.

Item—And first, I give to good Fathers and Mothers, but in trust for their children, nevertheless, all good little words of praise and all quaint pet names, and I charge said parents to use them justly but generously as the needs of their children shall require.

"Item—I leave to children exclusively, but only for the life of their childhood, all and every, the dandelions of the fields and the daisies thereof, with the right to play among them freely, according to the custom of children, warning them at the same time against thistles. And I devise to children the yellow shores of creeks and the golden sands beneath the waters thereof, with the dragon flies that skim the surface of said waters, and the odors of the willows that dip into the said waters, and the white clouds that float high over the giant trees.

"And I leave to children the long, long days to be merry in, in a thousand ways, and the Night and the Moon and the train of the Milky Way to wonder at, but subject, nevertheless, to the rights herein after given to lovers; and I give to each child the right to choose a star

that shall be his, and I direct that the child's father shall tell him the name of it, in order that the child shall always remember the name of that star after he has learned and forgotten astronomy.

"Item—I devise to boys jointly by all the useful idle fields and commons where ball may be played, and all snow-clad hills where one may coast, and all streams and ponds where one may skate to have and to hold the same for the period of their boyhood. And all meadows, with the clover blooms and butter-flies thereof; and all woods, with their apparitions of squirrels and whirring birds and echoes and strange noises; and all distant places which may be visited, together with the adventures there found, I do give to said boys to be theirs. And I give to said boys each his own place at the fireside at night, with all pictures that may be seen in the burning wood or coal to enjoy without let or hindrance and without any incumbrance of cares.

"Item—To lovers I devise, their imaginary world, with whatever they may need, as the stars of the sky, the red, red roses by the wall, the snow of the hawthorn, the sweet strains of music, or aught else they may desire to figure to each other the lastness and beauty of their love.

"Item—To young men, jointly, being joined in a brave, mad, crowd, I devise and bequeath all boisterous, inspiring sports of rivalry. I give to them the disdain of weakness and undaunted confidence in their own strength. Though they are rude and rough, I leave to them alone the power of making lasting friendships and of possessing companions; and to them exclusively I give all merry songs and brave choruses to sing, with smooth voices to troll them forth.

"Item—And to those who are no longer children or youths or lovers, I leave Memory, and I leave to them the volumes of the poems of Burns and Shakespeare, and of other poets, if there are others, to the end that they may live the old days over again freely and fully, without little or diminution; and to those who are no longer children or youths or lovers I leave, too, the knowledge of what a rare, rare world it is.
