FAMILY OUTLOOK FOR YEAR 1962

stocks into 1962 will be large. Egg production is expected to be higher and prices lower. Supplies of all food cereals will continue large and the upward trend in price will continue. Supplies of canned fruits will be large. Retail prices of most processed vegetables and fruits are expected to be a little higher due to increased processing and distribution costs. The price of fresh fruits will be lower. There is a trend toward use of low fat dairy products.

Housing prices increased 4% during 1961. The building trade predicts 1.4 million housing units will be built in 1962, a 5% to 7% increase over 1961. The Housing Act of 1961 has made loans easier for low and medium income families through the Federal Housing Administration and the Farmers Home Administration. Easier loans coupled with an expected 9% increase in net farm income in 1962 offer unprecedented opportunity for rural housing development in 1962.

Present supplies in furniture is expected to improve. Lumber and textile costs are creeping up and this is expected to influence furniture prices during the next year. 1962 may bring a halt to price decline in electrical appliances. Five manufacturers have announced price increases ranging from 3% to 5% to their distributors. They attribute the increase to the rising cost of materials and labor. Whether the distributor passes on this increase to the consumer will depend on demand.

In summary, most indications seem to justify a fairly optimistic view of 1962. Although the trend in prices, in general

will likely continue upward, the adequate rate of increase is expected to be moderate and supplies of food good and services will be quite adequate. The above information is based on a report by the Carolina Extension Service.
