Sniteman's main idea in getting the clubs started, he said, was "to actively involve ourselves in filling a gap in understanding and accurate information of the true purposes, accomplishments and goals of our college."

But, he said, club functions will go much beyond that. .They will be called on to furnish hosts and hostesses when home county groups or individuals visit East Carolina. And they will be asked to supply official delegates to accompany ECC officers on trips to home counties.


