Continued from Page 1 his alternate for tourists.

The alternate would begin in Hertford and follow the Perquimans River on the east side around Durants Neck and then go back up the Little River shore to U. S. 17. Most of the historical points of interest in Perquimans would be passed along that route, Edwards said.

The scenic highway program stipulates that funds will not be allotted unless a road begins and ends at a recreational site.

The routes outlined by Edwards would follow shorelines, but do not have developed recreation areas at terminal points. However, Edwards has long contended that the Perquimans River has tremendous potential for a beach and boating area.

Edwards and other members of the Chamber of Commerce will tour the river Thursday afternoon with Col. R. J. B. Page of the Department of Water Resources.

The tour alone the river will be to locate obstructions in the water and to determine how they can best be removed. Edwards said the river could be prime boating water when all obstructions are cleared,
