Wool Pool Announced

There will be a wool pool this year in Washington, N. C., on June 12 and 13. Last year there was no bid on the wool for the wool pool. Many producers carried over wool. This year prices will be as follows:

Clear wool, \$46.87 cwt.
Short land lambs, wool, \$41.01 cwt.
Light burry wool, \$38.73 cwt.
Heavy burry, stained and dead wool, \$34.18 cwt.
Tags, \$9.11 cwt.

While these prices are somewhat lower than 1955 prices, the incentive payment for 1967 is based on 66c. With a lower general price the incentive payments could be higher than last year.

All wool should be delivered to the Agriculture Building before 11 A. M., June 12, 1967. R. M. Thompson, County Extension Chairman, has arranged for transportation of the wool to Washington, N. C. The wool should be properly labeled.

Cotton Failure
Cotton regulations require all cotton failures to be reported to the office and if the failure occurs after May 15, 1967, a written request must be filed before the land can be planted to another crop. Failure to comply with this regulation will mean a loss of price support payments and history credit on the planted cotton. The cotton must not be plowed up until approval is given by a representative of the county office.

Certification Of Acreage
We have already received about 25 per cent of the acreage reports. Farms that will be visited and measured have already been selected. We urge everyone to file their report as soon as possible in order that we may complete the measurement job as early as possible. All wheat acreage on participating wheat farms and on farm where corn is planted in lieu of wheat must be reported by May 31, 1967.
