## Judge W. S. Privott Presides Over Varied District Court Session

Judge W. S. Privott, presiding at a session of Perquimans County District Court here June 7, sentenced Thad Revell, Jr., to four months on a driving under the influence of intoxicants charge. The sentence to be suspended upon payment of a \$100 fine and court costs.

William Dail, Jr., charged with failing to maintain proof of financial responsibility, was given 60 days. The sentence to be suspended upon payment of \$25.00 fine and court costs.

Herbert Vanzett Harrell, charged with speeding, was given a 30 day sentence. The sentence to be suspended upon payment of \$50 fine and court costs.

The court failed to find probable cause in the case charging Addie Mae Lily with manslaughter.

Jimmy Preston Byrum, charged with failing to drive same on the right half of the highway, was given a ten day jail sentence. The sentence to be suspended upon payment of \$10 fine and court costs.

The following were taxed with the costs for failing to have vehicle re-inspected: Milton Cecil Sawyer, George Quinton Holley, Lawrence B. Perry.

Morris Johnson Tatum, Sr., charged with failing to comply with the inspection law, was assessed with the costs as was Glenn Clifton.

Seth Thomas, charged with assault. Prayer for judgment continued upon payment of a fine of \$15.00 and the costs and that Thomas not drink any alcoholic beverages for 12 months.

The following were taxed with the costs for failing to yield the right-of-way: Geraldine Vaughan, Julie Auto Harvey, and Hubert Lee Correll.

Tom Crawford, Sylvester Welch and Alton Aubrey Jordan, each charged with improper equipment, were taxed with the costs.

Cecil Harris Perry, Jr., charged with improper lights, was assessed with the costs.

Estes Octavius Copeland, charged with failing to display two red flags on farm equipment on a N. C. highway, was taxed with the court costs.

## Town Board Adopts Budget With Same \$1.10 Tax Rate

The Hertford Town Board, meeting here Monday night in special session, gave tentative approval to the 1967-68 budget of \$307,300. The tax rate will remain the same, \$1.10 per \$100 assessed value for taxes.

Instead of increasing the taxes to take care of the increase in the budget, a \$1.00 per month sewer tax will be charged beginning with the July billing, which will be included in the water bill.

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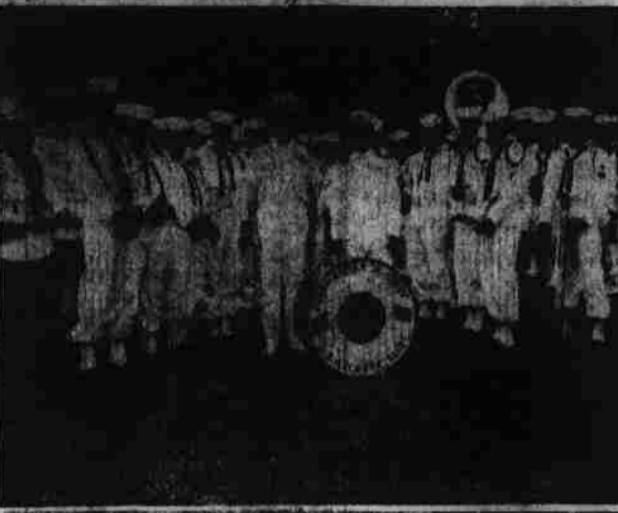

## Flag Day Celebration In Hertford Draws Big Crowd

Hertford's Flag Day parade, held last Wednesday, drew a crowd of spectators from Perquimans and surrounding counties of approximately 2,000.

Captain William H. Hardcastle, Jr., a native son, the parade marshal, led the American Legion officers and war veterans down the main street of Hertford in front of the Perquimans County Court House.

American flags waved as the parade passed. The American Fleet Band, directed by Lt. Donald Worthy Lake, a part of the Flag Day celebration, presented a concert on the Court House lawn.

Following the band were the American Legion color guard, World War veterans in cars, American Legion district officers, the American Legion Auxiliary, the Boy Scouts and Cub Scouts carrying flags, the Little League and the Perquimans County High School Marching Unit. The parade was concluded with horse and pony riders.
