Early reporting is very important to aid in controlling spread of the disease as well as insuring maximum indemnity.

Federal indemnity is based on one-half the differences between appraised value and net salvage valgrade and \$50.00 for regue, not to exceed \$40.00 for istered swine.

State indemnity is based on one-third the difference between the appraised value and the net salvage value, not to exceed \$12.50 for grade and \$25.00 for registered animals.

According to Parker, there has been no hog cholera reported in the 10-County Albemarle area However, 31 in 1967. cases have been reported in other nearby areas of the state.
