Lung Cancer

The United States Surgeon General has reported that despite intensive warning campaigns, more than half of all teenagers ignore the scientifically proved dangers to their health and become regular cigarette smokers by the time they are eighteen.

Yet cigarette smoking is estimated to cause upwards of 75 per cent of all cases of lung cancer which last year killed about 50,000 in the United States—42,400 men and almost 7,500 women.

Because of the teenage smoking trend and the tremendous toll of lung cancer "which has been called a national health catastrophe," the American Cancer Society is engaged in a five-year educational program to reduce cigarette smoking among teenagers by 50 per cent and in the general public by 25 per cent.

The American Cancer Society has reason to believe that people can be motivated to take proper action if they are continuously reminded of the facts. The Society emphasizes that the time to stop smoking is now. It is not true that after many years of smoking, it is useless to quit. The body has a great capacity to repair itself if given a chance.

Also, if a parent is a smoker, there is an added reason for giving up smoking. If a parent continues to smoke, the chances are his children will smoke too. The problem is one of continuous persuasive education, elimination of examples (youngsters like to prove they are adult by doing what adults do) and an end to the promotion of cigarette smoking as an enjoyable, attractive expression of adulthood, being a "real" woman, a "real" man.
