Miss Thelma Elliott, Legislative Chairman, presented an interesting and most informative program on the system of selecting a new jury which becomes effective in January. She along with Mr. Howard Pitt and Mr. Irving Turner were appointed to the Jury Commission whose job it was to make a completely new list of jurors regardless of race, color or creed. This, done under the clerk of court's office, was done by selecting names from the tax books, then the registration books if enough names were not available from them. This raw list was gone over and according to the guidelines by which they went, people such as non-residents, those who had served on the jury in the past two years, those under 21, those convicted of a felony and those who were known to be physically or mentally incompetent were dropped from the list.

These 1,200 to 1,300 names were then alphabetized on cards and then numbered. They are filed in the register of deeds office and when time comes to draw names for a jury, numbered discs are drawn in the clerk of court's office and matched to the corresponding numbered card in the register of deeds office. Those are the ones called for jury duty. Miss Elliott stated that she considered it a very fair and impartial way of selecting jurors. The Jury Commission will meet again in two years to go over the same process.
