Up bright and early each Wednesday morning now, for seventeen years, you'll see the smoke rising from the barbecue pit at Glenn's, and right then beside you'll find Glenn, turning and basting the hams and shoulders

And if you can call work a pleasure, these folks really seem to enjoy it. People come from far and near to get Glenn's barbecue, some eat it there, others buy it by the pound and take it to their homes. Many people passing through Hertford, have stopped and eaten at Glenn's and have returned to buy the barbecue on many occasions. This is just another business that the county can be proud of, that is bringing in shoppers from other places.
