The dwelling may affect family growth favorably or unfavorably depending upon the provisions it makes for social life both within the family group and among the family and friends, rest, privacy, and the routine activities of the household.

The houses in which we all live and which we all probably take very much for granted actually exert a powerful influence on our everyday experience of family living.

In considering the house as the important aspect of our lives, two things should be kept in mind: not only does man react specifically to the influence of the house in which he lives but the house in turn "reacts" in a similar manner to its inhabitants.

All members are urged to be present.

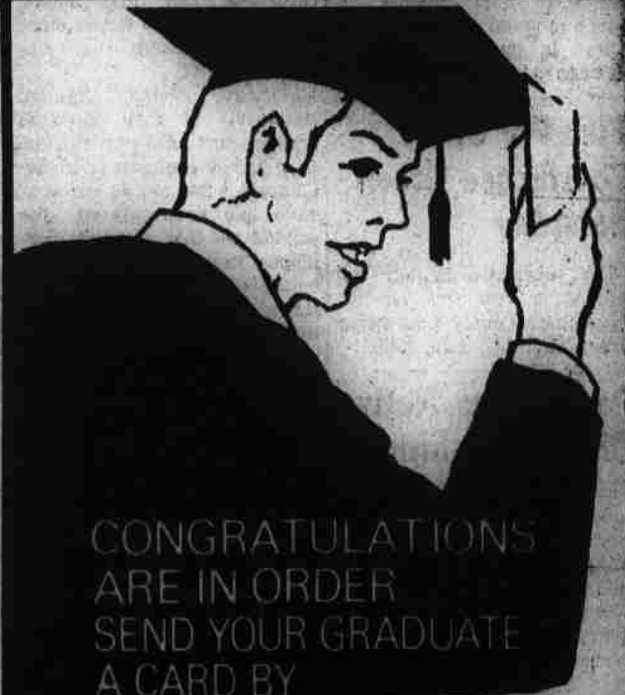
