"Careers Day" will be held Tuesday, October 26 at the College of the Albemarle Gymnasium at Elizabeth City, for high school and college students who are interested in careers in Mental Retardation and Developmental Disabilities. This is the first of a series of meetings to be held on college campuses across the State during the school year.

Students in a 10 county area, including Perquimans County, have been invited to attend the conference which will begin with registration at 8:30 a.m. and end at 1:30 p.m.

The program will include an address by Dr. Jerry C. Pickrel, Pathologist, Albemarle Hospital, Elizabeth City, Ray D. Newnam, Jr., Assistant Director, Mental Retardation Training Institute, will hold a special session for guidance counselors from 12:45-2:30.

Dr. Bruce S. Petteway, President, College of the Albemarle, will welcome the students. Dr. Irvin T. Boone, Elizabeth City State University, will give the invocation. Reverend George B. Holmes, St. Paul's Episcopal Church, Edenton, will preside.

Local U.S. Savings Bonds Sales Ahead Of Quota

September sales of U.S. Savings Bonds in North Carolina were \$5,574,600 a 7.1 percent increase over sales for September a year ago and the largest dollar for any September since 1945.

Amounting to \$55,852,290, January-September sales were 13.4 percent over the same period of 1970 and were the best 9-month record since 1945. This amounts to 87.8 percent of the state's 1971 dollar goal of \$63,600,000.

At the end of September, 21 counties had achieved 100 percent or more of their 1971 goal. They are: Alleghany, Brunswick, Caswell, Chatham, Chowan, Columbus, Greene, Haywood, Hertford, Macon, Perquimans, Pitt, Polk, Sampson, Union, Vance, Washington, Watauga, Wilkes, Wilson, and Yadkin. Closely following this honor roll list are 70 counties which have attained 75 percent or more of their goal through September.

Sales in Perquimans County for September were \$2,947,000. January-September sales totaled \$68,892,000. This represents 103.3 percent of Perquimans County's goal of \$66,700,000, according to R.L. Stevenson, Perquimans County Volunteer Chairman.
